


WHAT IS ASHRAB?

Alaska State Historical Records Advisory Board (ASHRAB) operates under the guidelines of the National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC). Every state has a historical records advisory board that serves as the central advisory body for their historical records planning. ASHRAB consists of at least nine members appointed by governor.

- The Alaska State Archivist is the board's coordinator and principal contact with NHPRC
- The Alaska State Historic Preservation Officer serves as the acting coordinator in the absence of the state archivist
- A representative from the native community
- A representative of local government
- Five other members who either work with historical records professionally or who do historical research

It is the board's responsibility to review NHPRC grant applications submitted by Alaska institutions and to facilitate cooperation with archival repositories statewide. The Alaska State Historical Records Advisory Board provides leadership and educational opportunities for the State's documentary heritage.




Our Mission

The Alaska State Historical Records Advisory Board believes that the collection and preservation of historical records, Alaska's priceless legacy, are fundamental to understanding our past and guiding our future. ASHRAB has two basic responsibilities.

First, the board reviews and recommends proposals to the National Historical Publications and Records Commission

NHPRC. Any nonprofit organization interested in preserving Alaska's historical records is eligible to apply for an NHPRC grant.

Second, the ASHRAB works to preserve the state's documentary heritage by working with organizations interested in preserving Alaska's historical records.



Grant Application

Grants are submitted through grants.gov. NHPRC sends applications to the State Coordinator for review by ASHRAB. The Board reviews each application to ensure the proposal is within the statement of priorities.
