I have the honor to report to you that I have received a letter from Dr. J.F. Calbreath, Superintendent of the Oregon State Insane Asylum that G. Hamilton, who was received May 23, 1901, has recovered and in condition to be discharged and that he desires to return to his home in Seattle. Dr. Calbreath reminds me that according to article Six such patients were to be furnished transportation back to Alaska. I have just answered him saying that I had no fund at my command for such a purpose and asked him to furnish the transportation to Seattle and charge the same in his accounts which I would approve and, that no doubt, that you would also approve the same, and that in the meanwhile I would write to you and ask for instructions thinking that this would be better than to keep the patient waiting so long at an additional expense to the Government.

I, therefore, desire to be instructed how to proceed in such cases in the future.

Your mailed May 21st did not reach Sitka until July 27th, and I was aboard the Revenue Cutter Perry which was making a voyage through S.E. Alaska.

The letter of instructions which I wrote you and which you acknowledge to have received is almost a literal copy of what the Secretary instructed me to write. Your first case after a jury has been adjudged insane and committed to your custody is by means of transcripts in duplicate properly certified by the superior the commissioner as the case may be, one copy to be retained by you for delivery with the patient at the nearest suitable place to the Governor together with the medical certificate for filing in his office. Upon the receipt of such advice the Governor will issue a permit to the Superintendent of the asylum for the reception of the insane person. This certificate with a copy of the court records should be provided by the superior for representation at the asylum. The instructions to the superior are to be supplied as to the case of the superior and the superior is to be supplied as to the case of the superior and the superior is to be supplied as to the case of the superior.

val and thereafter by him transmitted to the Interior Department for adjustment. Marshal Shoup has failed to comply with this last instruction by first sending them to me, how he is getting on I cannot say. I think the his accounts are being up in the Secretary's Department and will probably be so until he complies with the instruction. He wrote to the Superintendent of the Hospital wanting to know if he would receive the patients upon the order of the court without my permit and he was answered, no, because the contract called for it.

Now I am sorry if you have been delayed or caused great inconvenience but such is the inevitable nature of affairs in the present state of affairs in Alaska. And if your transcript which you should file here I should at once make out a certificate and send it to the Deputy clerk at Stagnay to be delivered to you - you may not but cannot proceed under the regulations until you send such a copy of the records. If you are forced to show evidence you must produce your vouchers for the same and they will be passed upon and will be approved or disapproved. I think that I am better acquainted with the situation than the auditor here in Washington and will be more inclined to protect you for what is right and reasonable for such services. Now this is all I can write at this time, hoping that I have made you clear to your satisfaction.

There is incarcerated here in the jail a prisoner by the name of M. E. SMITH who was sent here by the commissioner at Ft. Wrangell to serve two sentences, of one year each, on account of larceny of a suit of clothes and some gold nuggets. The District Attorney made use of Smith as a witness in the behalf of the Government in prosecuting a hard character from Ft. Wrangell. He became interested and has been very earnest in asking for Smith's pardon on the ground that the sentences imposed by the Commissioner were entirely out of proportion for the crimes alleged and that he has been a valuable witness on the behalf of the Government in a case where he needed his testimony. Not long since, I visited Ft. Wrangell and made strict inquiry in regard to Smith and found very few persons who had any thing to say or recommend in his behalf. The jailer here tells me, however, that he has been a good prisoner and has by his good conduct taken two months off of his first years sentence. In view of all the circumstances in this case, I think that the ends of justice have been met in his punishment thus far, and would recommend that you pardon him.




