I have this day addressed a letter to the Honorable Secretary of the Treasury making requisition upon him for the sum of nine hundred dollars for teachers salary for nine months at one hundred dollars per month, seven hundred dollars for the equipment of a building and two hundred ninety for fuel and lights.

I requested that the amount be transmitted to your treasurer Mr. M. A. Meenach.

I have not thought it proper to approve it at one hundred twenty-five per month because I am quite sure you can get a good teacher for one hundred dollars per month and you had made no provision for fuel and light in the amount of the bond.

No answer as yet has been received from the authorities at Washington concerning the first requisition which was sent from Sitka on the 19th of May.

We are much put out by this and if you are delayed you will know that others are in the same boat.

Neither do I know how much is in the school fund. I am presuming that five months will be reckoned the minimum school year.

If the Comptroller of the Currency interprets the law differently we shall have to abide by his decision until we can get the law amended.

I shall inform you at the earliest opportunity as to whatever I may learn on this question.

I myself believe that the man Early is a thorn in the flesh of the people of that community and should be removed as soon as possible.

I hope that you will give this matter your earnest attention and if necessary to incur extra expense that you will take the matter up by wire with the Attorney General to be able to give the community relief.
