

Sir:-

There has been filed in this office by the Clerk of the Court, 3rd District of Alaska, copy of papers in the matter of the Catalla school District.

The necessary steps in the procedure have been taken according to law, and a bond of the Treasurer filed in the sum of \$4,000.00.

I, therefore, recommend that you transmit from the Alaska Fund to the Treasurer, William Carless, the following moneys:

For rent of building, fuel & lights,	\$325.00
" teachers salaries, 5 months,	<u>825.00</u>
Total,	\$950.00

There are sufficient children at Catalla at present to comply with the provisions of the law regarding school districts but I am doubtful whether that condition will exist for more than a year, as many of the people are moving away and going to the new town of Orca, and I therefore am asking for rent of building instead of for construction of school house, until such time as we can determine whether we will be justified in the erection of a building for the continuance of the school.



I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 10th ultimo regarding inadequacy of allowance for building school house at Cleary. Section 5 of the Nelson Bill provides that not more than \$1,000.00 shall be paid for the construction and equipment of a school house in any school district established under the provisions of this Act.

As the law now stands, therefore, the money allotted you is all that can be obtained. I propose, however, to have some alterations made in this law, which will permit me to exercise more discretion in the amount to be allotted to the different school districts for building purposes, as no doubt your claim is a just one, and the law should be more flexible to meet such conditions as you have to contend with.

I trust that you will be able to make out with what has been allotted you for this year, and that you will make your report of the school and requisition for funds for next year early, that these funds may be provided you.



I am just in receipt, by reference from you, of a letter from Miss Alma Delaney making inquiries regarding certain provisions for the Government of Alaska, and thinking that you would like to answer her letter direct, I will send you the information.

The incorporated towns of Alaska are, Ketchikan, Treadwell, Douglas, Juneau, Skagway, Valdez, Fairbanks, Nome, Eagle, Wrangell, Chena and Council.

The public schools for children of white and mixed blood outside of incorporated towns are supported by the Alaska Fund, created under the Nelson Bill, approved January 27th, 1905, which provides that twenty-five per cent of all moneys received from licenses outside of incorporated towns in Alaska shall be devoted to the maintenance of schools outside of incorporated towns, and expended under the direction of the Governor.

The Native schools are supported by a general appropriation of Congress and are under the charge of the Bureau of Education of the Interior Department.

The Carter Code making further provisions for a civil government for Alaska and for other purposes, approved June 6th, 1900, has been amended from time to time in reference to incorporated towns and school provisions until the law as it now stands provides for

the organization of a school board consisting of three members, a director, a treasurer and a clerk, to be elected annually by a vote of all adults who are citizens of the United States.

These schools are supported by funds from the clerk of the District Court, one-half of the license moneys received for trade and occupation taxes within the limits of the incorporated town, but if this should be insufficient, the Act last above referred to, provides that the Council can assess, levy and collect a general tax, not to exceed two per centum of the assessed valuation upon all real and personal property.

In order to secure funds for the maintenance of schools under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved January 27th, 1905, it will be necessary for the school districts to observe the following rules:

- 1.- A school board shall be elected annually on the 11th day of April, after posting notices at least ten days in advance of such election.
- 2.- Members of the board as soon as elected must file their oaths of office with the Clerk of the Court of the District in which the school is maintained.
- 3.- The Treasurer must execute bond in twice the sum of the amount needed for the maintenance of the school for the following year. This bond when executed to be forwarded to the Clerk of the Court for his approval.
- 4.- At the end of the school term the board will report to this office in writing the length of the term, the number and names of teachers, the wages paid the teachers and the daily average attendance of each term.
- 5.- The board must forward with this report an estimate of the amount needed for the maintenance of the school for the following year.





I am in receipt of your letter of Nov. 19th, 1906. In the last paragraph I note what you say in regard to local boards making laws compelling attendance for a certain number of weeks in each year.

I have referred this matter to the U.S. Attorney for this Judicial Division for his opinion, and for your information I enclose heron extract of his letter on the subject.

"The question as asked by Mr. Goss is ambiguous for this reason; it is not possible to determine whether he means to make laws compelling the attendance of all the children of school age, or whether he means to make laws compelling attendance for certain number of weeks of those already going to school and registered on the school roll. But whatever he means it is not possible under our laws for the residents or local board to make laws compelling the attendance of school children for a certain number of weeks. Where children are enrolled and going to school it is possible for the local board to make rules or regulations requiring attendance for a specified time, but it will be necessary to ascertain from Mr. Goss, before an answer can be

given to his question, just what he means, namely; whether all school children within the jurisdiction of the local board, or whether those children only who are going to school and enrolled upon the school register; so I would suggest that you write to him stating these facts and get more definite information as to what he wants."
