My Dear Sir:-

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 2nd inst., concerning the Meyer children. I have had one letter from Sacha since she arrived at her new home in Ohio, which indicates that she is happy and contented there. I am glad of this.

The little boy is with his mother in Seattle. It does not seem hardly right that children of this age should be separated so long, as to be in danger of becoming lost from each other.

We have had no further information concerning the probability of authority being granted us to receive children from Alaska, but are hoping for favorable legislation. We have written Dr. Jackson what we would like. If you can aid us in any way it would be appreciated very much. It seems to me that what we now need is to have the authority inserted in our regular appropriation bill, where it reads:- "For the support and maintenance of 600 children at the Salem Indian School, \$100,200.00", and be made to read:- "For the support and maintenance of 600 children at the Salem Indian School, including Alaskan children, \$100,200.00."

We will push the matter as much as we can from here. At the

present we know of no real influences working against us but of course, to accomplish the result, we must be on the alert to not allow it to go by default.

We appreciate your action in connection with the Meyer children and hope to have the pleasure of meeting you at Chemawa when you can make it convenient.

Dear

Under date of September 12, 1904, I was instructed, by the Honorable Commissioner of Indian Affairs, to return to their homes, within six months, such Alaskan children as were in attendance at this school. Consequently, I have to request that you send me sufficient money to pay the fare of _____ from Chemawa to _____ or such place as you may designate. The fare from Chemawa to Seattle is \$7.10 for pupils over 12 years of age and \$3.55 for pupils under 12 years of age.

In replying, please state particularly the place to which you desire _____ sent, giving fully, explicit directions so as to enable me to arrange for their safe passage.

Since receiving the above instructions, I have noticed in the public press and in the Congressional Record that there has been legislation concerning the education of the Alaskan Indians. What the effect of this legislation will be has not yet been fully determined. Should the Honorable Commissioner conclude that the children now here may be allowed to remain, he will probably so inform me between now and the first of April. However, at the present time, I can give you no assurance of their being permitted to remain, and desire to be in a position to return them promptly by the first of April, if necessary. Such expense money as you may send to me will be held in trust, to be used only for the expense of returning pupils to their homes. In the event of my being authorized to retain Alaskan Indian children, you will be so informed, and the money will be subject to your order and will be returned to you on demand. In returning children to Alaska, careful provision will be made for their care and safety, and an escort provided, if deemed necessary.

Dear Sir:

Replying to your letter of October 3, I have the honor to say that the Board of Road Commissioners has not submitted its report to the War Department for the year, and therefore has but little to give you in the way of information concerning its work, that would be of value in your report. The board is glad, however, to furnish you a statement of the work actually accomplished. This embraces:

First, the location and survey of a wagon road from the head of the Mendenley Sound to Hetta Inlet on Prince of Wales Island, near Ketchikan;

Second, survey of road from Haines Mission to "Mindestucky" on the Chilkat, and reconnaissance of the route from there to Wells with a survey of the trail from Wells to the boundary near Pleasant Camp;

Third, collection of preliminary data for a route not yet definitely determined upon from the head of Gastineau Channel to a point near the southern extremity of Berner's Bay;

Fourth, work of re-location and improvement of the trail from Valdez to the mouth of the Gokana River, thence via the head of the Big Delta to the Tanana and down the Tanana to Fairbanks;

Fifth, such work of improvement as the funds permitted on the roads leading from the terminus of the Tanana Mines Railway at Gilmore to the "Summit", and thence to Cleary Creek and also from the "Summit" to Fairbanks Creek;

Sixth, Preliminary reconnoissance and location of road from Council city to the East Fork of Solomon River, and a road from Nome northward via the head of Nome River and towards the Kougrek River.

The total amount of money received by the Board for the season was only \$28,000.00, and the only work of actual construction and improvement was done on the roads between Valdez and Fairbanks and from Fairbanks to the creeks. You can fully appreciate how small a showing this amount of money would make over so vast a district.

I met with support from the people throughout the country and received material assistance from them wherever it was practicable to give it to me without detriment to their own interests.

The conditions for road construction are quite as favorable as I looked for, and more so in the Nome District than my previous experience had led me to expect.

This brief information, Governor, is a matter of general knowledge, and if you care to use it I would ask you to do so as your own and not as coming from the Board. In case you should care to make any suggestions or recommendations in the matter, I would say that the only thing needful is some improvement or addition to the law whereby a greater amount of money may become available.

The total amount of license money collected in the Third Division during the fiscal year from July 1st 1904 to the 30th day of June 1905 was \$ 173,219.91 of this amount the sum of \$ 90,329.00 was for Liquor licenses.

The estimated population for basis for liquor license was under the one thousand mark for all but in the Town of Fairbanks, In the Town of Fairbanks it was under the 1000 mark up to November 1904 then the license was increased to \$ 1000.00 the population having increased to over the 1000 mark and again in March the population having increased passed the 1500 mark the license was again increased to ~~the~~ \$ 1500.00 in Fairbanks which is the basis now all others at present being under the 1000 mark. Dear Governor: In accordance with the suggestions made to you by Dr Coe and myself, I have investigated the matter of Mrs Sarah Cascaden, who is an inmate of this Sanitarium. I was unable to get from her any more definite a list of the property she claims than I give below. She says that it is all recorded in the proper recorder's offices in Alaska.

She says she is the owner of North Pole claim, on the first bench on Solomon river; No 5, Little Hurrah; Northern Light; White Rose, all recorded in the office at Nome in her name. Then she owns the Palace Restaurant building at Solomon; Creamery Restaurant at Nome; and a cabin with three rooms, two houses from the Catholic Church between 3rd and 4th streets on an alley, at Nome.

By virtue of having grub staked the parties, she owns an undivided one third interest in the following quartz mining claims and locations:

"Ida G" quartz claim, located August 25th 1902 in the name of W.R. Goode, notice of location recorded in Vol 114, page 156, Cape Nome Mining and Recording district.

"Blue Bird" quartz claim located Aug 21 1902 in name of Robert Ford notice of location recorded Vol 114 page 157;

"Blue Bell" quartz claim located Aug 23 1902 in name of Robert Ford notice of location recorded Vol 114 page 158.

"Good Thing" quartz claim located Aug 21 1902 in the name of W R Goode notice of location recorded in Vol 114 page 159.

"Penobscot" quartz claim located Aug 21 1902 in name of George Mitchell, and notice of location recorded in Vol 114 page 160."

"Rainy Day" quartz claim located Aug 21 1902 in the name of E M Van Slyck and notice of location recorded in Vol 114, page 161.

All of said mining claims being located on the right limit of Big Hurrah Creek and on or near Trilby creek.

I understand that a man named Dr Moore, of Nome, has been appointed administrator at a salary of \$10 a day, and it is believed that at that rate he will absorb all the property. A Dr Pohl of Portland, who knew her in Alaska, is interested in the matter, and I have talked with him. He says that Lane of San Francisco has desired to become possessed of one of the claims of Mrs Carscaden; that she was offered \$50,000 for it and declined to sell; and Dr Pohl believes that there is a scheme to rob this woman of her property. She has a husband, who is said to be in Nevada, and who is not of much account. She also has a 16 year old son supposed to be in Alaska, but the woman does not know of his whereabouts. She appears to be to be a very excitable woman, and I would not be disposed to take much stock in what she says, unless it can be backed up by the records. If this can be done, it would certainly seem to me that something should be done to preserve her property and not let it be frittered away.

I shall be glad to hear of any information you can learn concerning the matter, and to follow up at this end of the line any suggestions that you can make.

Sir:-

I send you by Deputy U. S. Marshall James W. Helms, two patients, both having been duly adjudged insane, as you will see by the commitments Mr. Helms will hand you. Their names are William Baur and Alexander H. Carpenter.

I take it that Governor Brady of Alaska, has contracted with the Steilacoom Asylum for all patients sent from Alaska, as that is the nearest asylum, and the law which passed Congress June 6th, authorized and directed him to contract with an asylum west of the main range of the Rocky Mountains for all the Alaska insane. I have not yet been notified, but have heard unofficially that he ~~has~~ contracted with the Steilacoom Asylum. In case the contract has not been made, you will please receive these men and immediately notify Governor Jhon G. Brady, Juneau, Alaska, who will contract with you and pay you. In any event I want you to receive these men and I will see that you are paid. By at once notifying Governor Brady he will attend to the matter at once. I am obliged to send these men out now as the last ships are leaving for the states and I cannot wait for official notification of where to send them.

Sir:

Your letter of October 18th has been received enclosing an offer received by you from the Oregon State Insane Asylum to care for the insane of the District of Alaska as patients at that institution, at the rate of thirteen dollars (\$13) per capita per month, upon the condition that the State is to be at no expense for transportation to or from the asylum.

In response thereto, I transmit herewith a form of contract providing for the care at said institution of legally adjudged insane of the District of Alaska for one year from the date thereof. The rate at which the State offers to care for the insane of Alaska is regarded as extremely low and, in view of the many conditions in this contract to be observed and performed on the part of the authorities of the asylum, it may be that they will be unwilling to sign the contract as it now stands at the rate above mentioned; in such case you are authorized to agree with the State for the care of the Alaskan insane at a rate of not exceeding twenty dollars (\$20) per month per capita, that being the minimum rate which is charged at the Government Hospital for the Insane in this city for persons at that institution.

The contract should be executed in quintuplicate together with bond in the penal sum of at least \$5000 for the faithful performance of the conditions thereof, the latter duly approved by you, and forwarded to the Department for the approval of the Secretary. To one copy of the executed contract there should be attached by you the enclosed oath of disinterestedness.

Should this contract be executed, without material changes therein, you are authorized before its approval by the Department and in order to expedite matters, to at once forward copies thereof to the several United States marshals in and for the District of Alaska for their information and guidance, calling their attention to the fact that under section 9 of the act of June 6, 1900, for the expenses incurred by them for service of process in connection with and the guarding and transportation of the insane of Alaska to the asylum selected for the accommodation of such persons, they are to be compensated as in the case of prisoners, and vouchers in triplicate covering such expenses should be prepared and forwarded for your approval and thereafter by you transmitted to this Department for adjustment.

You will also instruct the Marshals that before taking any insane persons to the institution with which contract has been made for their care and custody, they will procure transcripts in duplicate of the court records as to the persons legally adjudged insane, retaining one copy for delivery at the institution and forwarding the other copy to you for your files

together with the medical certificate herewith enclosed, which is similar to that used for persons confined in the Government Hospital for the Insane. Upon receipt of such evidence as to the insanity of the persons mentioned therein, you will issue a permit to the Superintendent of the Oregon State Insane Asylum for the reception at that institution of such insane persons. This commitment, together with the duplicate copy of the court records, should be presented by the marshal, or his representative, at such State asylum. In every instance where such a commitment is issued by you, a copy thereof should be at once forwarded to the Secretary of the Interior together with a statement as to the time the several insane patients entered the asylum.

If at any time further instructions in this connection are desired, they will be supplied upon application to the Department.

Your letter of the 1st instant has been received in which you state that an exigency existing the Marshal for the District of Alaska has placed two insane people in that District at Steilacoom Insane Asylum in the State of Washington and request instructions in the matter.

In response thereto I have to state that if you will wire the Department on your arrival at Steilacoom, Washington, as to the condition of these patients and the amount which is due the asylum for their care and maintenance, you will be promptly advised by wire as to the necessary steps to take in the matter.

In this connection, it may be stated, however, that as definite instructions can be given in the premises until it is definitely ascertained whether the Oregon State Insane Asylum is willing to enter into contract with the Department for the care of the legally adjudged insane of Alaska upon the terms set forth in a form of contract this day forwarded to you.

Sir:-

I have the honor to report that on the 15th inst. I arrived at Portland, Ore. and on the next day I proceeded to Salem, where I met Governor Gear, Secretary of State, Dunbar, and State Treasurer, More, who are by law the trustees of the Oregon Insane Asylum, and who are authorized to contract in the State's behalf for this institution. The matters connected with it were talked over and they thought that the bid which they submitted to me first was too low and that they had not taken into consideration matters of clothing and the like. The contract which I brought was read over and the conditions of the bond were omitted, in that it was the State of Oregon, and not a private institution which was contracting. The officers felt that the State did not need to give a bond, and I coincided with their view. A provision was added to the contract as follows:

" Sixth.- Said party of the first part, upon receipt of notification from the party of the second part, agrees to furnish transportation and expenses for any patient discharged as cured from said institution back to Alaska."

These officers felt that such a provision should be made because they could not contract to receive patients into the State Institution from abroad who were liable to become a care upon their hands, after

being discharged as cured, and that if they did so there would be a cry set up against them as not caring for the interests of the State, and I submitted to this condition as being just and proper.

In view of the matter which they had not considered, I agreed to put the price at the rate of \$240 per annum per patient, or \$20 per month. The Superintendent of the prison, Dr. Calbreath was present during the negotiations and I visited the institution with him. It is a very large institution, having about 1100 patients, and it is most admirably kept. The wards were as clean and tidy as those in St. Elisabeth's Hospital in your City. The greatest kindness and care is exercised towards the patients and they have an abundance of everything to eat and for their comfort. The farm is a rich one consisting of 1200 acres and nearly all the labor is performed by the patients, and from every point of view it is as good an institution of its kind that we could wish.

After this business was completed, I proceeded to Steilacoom, Washington and found upon inquiry that the two patients which had been sent down from Cape Horn by Marshall Vauter are being cared for and that they had made some improvement, but are still in an insane state and unsafe to be set at large. Regular proceedings were held in the Commissioner's Court at St. Michael to hear the complaint of insanity against these persons and three doctors gave their testimony in each case and they were adjudged insane by said commission and committed to the Marshall as such. He sent copies of the proceedings

to the institution when they were committed, one of which I enclose and the other I take with me to Sitka.

In regard to the compensation for these patients, we agreed to pay the institution the rate for which I had contracted with the Oregon Insane Asylum, making up to the 24th inst. \$60 each for their custody and treatment. The doctor said that he could have them transferred from Steilacoom to Salem, which would require two guards, and the total cost estimated at \$20.00 for each patient would amount to a total of \$160.00

I telegraphed these facts to you on that date but up to the present have received no answer. I have therefore, today proved the vouchers and ordered him to transfer said patients to Salem, as I don't think that it could be done cheaper any other way. The steamship leaves tomorrow night for Sitka and I shall return upon her and furnish the Marshall with copies of the contract, and doubtless the Marshall at Juneau will transfer the insane patients from Sitka at once to Salem.

Sir :-

Governor Brady of Alaska has furnished me with a copy of an agreement between himself and you, for the care and custody of persons legally adjudged insane in the District of Alaska. The laws of that District require that the Marshal shall deliver such insane persons to your institution, but Governor Brady has written me , that in addition to a certified copy of the order of the Court adjudging a person insane, a permit from him must also accompany the committment.

Now I desire to know if you will refuse to receive an insane patient from Alaska, if adjudged insane conformable to law, and a duly certified copy of the order of the Court so adjudging is delivered with the patient, unless you also receive a permit from the Governor of Alaska, to receive him. If this is required the usefulness of the contract will be greatly impaired, and in many instances made valueless, for the reason that the said Governor does not reside where any Court is held and he can only be communicated with semi-monthly, under favorable conditions, and as there are three marshals in the District, two of them out off from transportation the major part of the year, it will require months in many cases to get the said permit after the patient is adjudged insane. No law requires, in my opinion, the issuance of such a permit, it can add no force to the committment and it seems to me it is folly to require it , on account of delay, expense and injustice to the



My Dear Governor:-

Yours of August 19th enclosing permits for persons adjudged insane received. Since receiving your letter two more have been adjudged insane, and in accordance with your instructions contained in your letter of August 19th I am sending them out with the other four, and trust there will be no trouble in getting them to the Asylum.

One of my deputies, Mr. P. P. Clingan, will go out in charge and I have made arrangements with him to advance out of his private funds all of the necessary money for paying the expenses of transportation and for guards, so that the money coming from the Interior Department to pay these expenses will all belong to him, and as he is not coming back this winter, and as navigation will have been closed before word can be received from the Interior Department, I trust that you will be able to so arrange matters that the draft from the Interior Department will be made payable to him direct and be sent to him at his home in Seattle.

The taking out of these six insane is necessarily going to make quite a large item of expense, as no steamship company seems to desire to have so many insane passengers when the capacity of each steamer is being crowded to overflowing by our citizens of all classes. There is one of these insane persons who has been confined in the

hospital practically bed ridden for the past ninety days, and taking care of him has made a large bill of expense, and getting him to the Asylum will be necessarily expensive. While a few of them are not violent, some of them are in such condition as to require great attention and think it will be impracticable for Mr. Clingan to undertake to take them to the Asylum with less than one guard for each patient, and I have instructed him to hire the necessary guards, taking their vouchers and presenting them, together with the vouchers for transportation and other necessary expenses to you, and ask your approval of the same at your earliest convenience.

In order that the matter may be straightened up within a reasonable time I have instructed Mr. Clingan to proceed to Sitka and present these matter to you in person.

Dear Sir:

A copy of the contract was sent in a separate envelope and no doubt you have received it ere this, but to be sure that you have one, my secretary has copied another for you. Enclosed you will find a half dozen medical certificates and in case you need more, make a request for the same through the Miscellaneous Division of the Department of the Interior.

Please understand that the instructions which were sent you were not of my getting up but were drawn up in the Interior Department. To save trouble it will be well to follow them as near as possible. The contract with the Asylum is for a year only. In the next contract I shall know how to grease the gidgeens so as to make matters move more smoothly.

Now in case you have to bring out persons, it will be best for you to take them directly to Salem and I will instruct the Superintendent to receive them temporarily and when I get your copy of transcript and medical certificate, I can forward the permits to him. I think that the Secretary of the Interior will approve of this plan as it will not occur more than once or twice during the year.

Enclosed you will find four commitments for the persons whom you now hold in custody.

In regard to your vouchers, I knew that the instructions somewhat disconcert you but there may be some reason in the Auditors Department which requires it to be done this way, so you had better strictly comply. Marshal Sheup has not so far complied with this instruction and some weeks ago his clerk told me that none of his bills had been yet settled. They probably will not be until he complies with his instructions. This is one of the things that can be straightened out in the next contract.

I met your brother here briefly. He gave me a statement of the survivor of the prospecting party who were attacked on Unimak Island. It was a horrible murder. I gave him a copy of the letter which I sent to the Secretary of the Interior. I am sorry that I am so perfectly helpless in such matters. The cutter "Grant" brought the news that the force from the cutter "Manning" had captured the murdered but we had no particulars whatever. I hope that they will be brought to trial speedily before Judge Wickersham.

I am in receipt, by reference from the Honorable Attorney General, of your letter of the 15th ultime in regard to the delay incident to carrying into effect instructions of this Department relative to requiring a permit from the Governor before sending insane persons to the State Insane Asylum in Oregon for care and maintenance, under the contract with the latter made by the Governor of Alaska with the approval of the Department.

I also note that you take exceptions to the regulations of the Department requiring the Marshals in Alaska to forward to this Department, for adjustment, the vouchers for expenses incurred in transporting insane persons to said asylum, and that you are not aware of any ~~provision~~ provision for the Department of the Interior to pay expenses incurred by your office.

In response thereto, I ~~wish~~ to state that inasmuch as it appears that the requiring of a ~~permit~~ permit from the Governor to take insane persons to the Oregon State Asylum will result in great delay, owing to the fact that there are three districts in Alaska widely separated, the Governor has this day been advised that in

the future his permit will not be necessary to the commitment of insane persons to the Oregon Asylum.

Regarding the forwarding of your vouchers for expenses incurred for guarding and transportation of insane in Alaska for which, under section 9 of the Act of June 6, 1900, "making further provision for a civil government for Alaska" U. S. Marshals "shall be compensated as in the case of prisoners," no modifications can be made, as the appropriation for such expense made in the Act above referred to can only be disbursed under section 2 of said Act by the "Secretary of the Treasury out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, on accounts and vouchers duly approved by the Governor and the Secretary of the Interior".

There is herewith transmitted, for your information, a copy of an opinion of the Comptroller of the Treasury rendered at the instance of this Department as to the proper construction of so much of the Act of Congress, approved June 6, 1900, above mentioned, as relates to the care, maintenance etc. of persons legally adjudged insane in the District of Alaska.

"In the act of Congress 'making provision for a civil government for Alaska, and for other purposes', approved June 6, 1900, it is provided, among other things, that the Governor of the District of Alaska shall,

"Subject to the direction and approval of the Secretary of the Interior, advertise for and receive bids and, in behalf of the United States, contract from year to year with the responsible asylum or sanitarium west of the main range of the Rocky Mountains submitting the lowest bid for the care and custody of persons legally adjudged insane in said district of Alaska; the cost of advertising for bids, executing the contract, and caring for the insane to be paid, until otherwise provided by law, by the Secretary of the Treasury, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, on accounts and vouchers duly approved by the Governor and the Secretary of the Interior."

"In response to the advertisement soliciting proposals for the care of the insane of the District of Alaska the Department has received a satisfactory proposition which is now under consideration.

"In order to properly carry into effect the provisions of the statute above mentioned, it will be necessary to transport persons legally adjudged insane in the District of Alaska from that district to the section of the United States in which the asylum selected for the purpose is located. Before entering into a contract for the care of the insane, I have the honor to request to be advised as to whether, under the act above mentioned, the cost of transportation, etc., of the insane patients from the District of Alaska to the United States as well as the expense of the attendant accompanying such insane persons can be defrayed out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated."

The contract to be made with the asylum, or sanitarium, is for the "care and custody" of the insane, and an appropriation is made for "executing the contract". This makes ample provision for all "care and custody" rendered by the contracting asylum. The act contains a further provision for "caring for the insane". Sir:

The Department has been advised by the U. S. Marshal at Nome, Alaska, that its regulations requiring the issuance by you of a commitment to the Oregon State Asylum for persons adjudged insane has resulted in delay in the transaction of business owing to the great distance from Sitka of the judicial districts in Alaska and the infrequency of mails. It has been deemed advisable, therefore, to no longer require the issuance of such a commitment by you in the case of insane persons.

All that portion of Department letter of December 29, 1900, after the second paragraph on page 2, is hereby canceled and revoked, and in lieu thereof the following is substituted, to wit:

You will also instruct the marshals that before taking any insane persons to the institution with which contract has been made for their care and custody, they will procure transcripts, in duplicate, of the court records as to the persons legally adjudged insane, retaining one copy for delivery at the institution, together with a form of medical certificate herewith enclosed, which is similar to that used in giving the history of persons confined in the Government Hospital for the Insane, and forwarding the other copy of the court records of persons legally adjudged insane for your files.

The duplicate copy of the court records and the medical certificate above mentioned should be presented by the marshal, or his representative, at the Oregon State Insane Asylum, and the Superintendent of that institution is authorized to accept the

same as evidence of the right of the persons named in such court proceedings to receive care and treatment in the asylum.

In every instance where such copies of the court records are received by you from the marshal, as to designating the persons legally adjudged insane, you will communicate with the Superintendent of the Oregon State Asylum, ascertaining the time when the several insane persons entered the institution, and promptly advise the Department. This is essential to the proper auditing of the accounts of the asylum for care and maintenance of insane persons in Alaska.

If at any time further instructions in this connection are desired, they will be supplied upon application to the Department.

I transmit herewith copy of a letter this day addressed to the Marshal at Nome, Alaska, advising him as to this change in the regulations governing insane persons in Alaska.

Your letter of June 29, 1901, has been received regarding the insane of Alaska, in which you state:

I have received a letter from Dr. J. F. Calbreath, Superintendent of the Oregon State Insane Asylum that G. Hamilton, who was received May 23, 1901, has recovered and in condition to be discharged and that he desires to return to his home in Seattle. Dr. Calbreath reminds me that according to article Six such patients were to be furnished transportation back to Alaska. I have just answered him saying that I had no fund at my command for such a purpose and asked him to furnish the transportation to Seattle and charge the same in his accounts which I would approve and, that no doubt that you would also approve the same, and that in the meanwhile I would write to you and ask for instructions thinking that this would be better than to keep the patient waiting so long at an additional expense to the Government.

I, therefore, desire to be instructed how to proceed in such cases in future.

In response thereto, I have to state that as soon as the accounts of the Oregon State Asylum for the care of the insane of Alaska are received, together with vouchers for the transportation furnished from the asylum to Seattle to G. Hamilton, whom you state has been discharged as cured, the matter will be at once submitted to the Treasury Department for a ruling as to whether such expense is a proper charge against the appropriation, and you will be

Sir,

I have received your letter of the 25th ultimo, requesting a review of my decision of November 24, 1900, made at your request, covering the question of the expenditure of the appropriation made in the Act of June 6, 1900 (31 Stat. 322) for the care and maintenance of persons legally adjudged insane in the District of Alaska.

That act among other things provides that the Governor of Alaska shall

"Subject to the discretion and approval of the Secretary of the Interior, advertise for and receive bids and, in behalf of the United States, contract from year to year with the responsible asylum or sanitarium west of the main range of the Rocky Mountains submitting the lowest bid for the care and custody of persons legally adjudged insane in said District of Alaska; the cost of advertising for bids, executing the contract, and caring for the insane to be paid, until otherwise provided by law, by the Secretary of the Treasury, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, on accounts and vouchers duly approved by the Governor and the Secretary of the Interior."

In your letter requesting a decision you said:

In order to carry into effect the provisions of the statute above recited, it will be necessary to transport persons legally adjudged insane in the District of Alaska from that district to the nearest asylum in the United States in which the asylum selected for the purpose is located. Before entering into a contract for the care of the insane, I have the honor to request to be advised as to whether, under the Act above mentioned, the cost of transportation, etc., of the insane patients from the District of Alaska to the United States as well

as the expense of the attendant accompanying such insane persons can be defrayed out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated."

In my reply I stated that the specific appropriation for "executing the contract" made ample provision for all "care and custody" rendered by the contracting asylum, and drew the conclusion that the further provision for "caring for the insane" was intended to cover all other expenses for caring for the insane that might grow out of the requirements of the law. Hence I held that the cost of transportation, etc., of the insane prior to their surrender to the contracting asylum, as well as the expenses of attendance, was provided for in the Act.

In your present letter you state that acting upon this decision you issued instructions to the Governor of Alaska, stating that the expenses incurred by United States marshals for guarding and transporting the insane of Alaska would be paid from this appropriation upon vouchers duly approved by himself and the Secretary of the Interior.

You state further:

"Subsequently, Frank H. Richards, Marshal for the Second Division of the District of Alaska, appealed from the action of the Secretary in requiring him to submit vouchers for such expense, claiming that undue hardship was imposed upon the marshals thereby, and the Department by letter dated August 22nd, (copy of which is herewith transmitted) declined to modify such regulation.

"I am now in receipt of a letter from the Acting Attorney General, under date of the 22nd instant, (copy of which is herewith transmitted) in which he states that the regulation in question has resulted in imposing hardships upon the United States marshals as under it they are required to pay the expenses of transportation of the insane in Alaska to the asylum or sanitarium selected by this Department for their care and maintenance from their private funds and await the settlement of their respective accounts for reimbursement, and suggesting that if such expenses were payable from the appropriation for "salaries, fees and expenses of marshals United States Courts", the marshals would pay the same from funds already advanced to them from said appropriation.

"I have the honor, therefore, to request that you will favor

me with an expression of your views as to whether the expenses incurred by the marshals of the District of Alaska in carrying into effect the provisions of section 9 of the Act of June 6, 1900, above mentioned, should be properly paid from the annual appropriations for salaries, fees and expenses of marshals United States courts, or from the permanent indefinite appropriation provided in section 2 of said Act of June 6, 1900 for the care and custody of persons legally adjudged insane in the District of Alaska."

It is of course to be understood that any hardship imposed upon United States marshals or other officers by regulations required by law must be charged to the law and not to the regulations, and that the executive officers are powerless to cure the evil, but if on a further and more careful consideration of all the questions involved, though not clearly brought out in my former decision, I am convinced that, so far as concerns the expenses of United States marshals for guarding and transporting the insane in Alaska, that decision was wrong, any regulations made by you growing out of it may be modified or revoked by you. At the time it was made, I was endeavoring to distinguish clearly between the expenses of "care and custody" of the insane to be borne by the contracting asylum and any other expenses of "caring for the insane", and held that the care and custody on the part of the asylum being provided for in terms, the provision for caring for the insane was applicable to other expenses connected with the insane. I overlooked, and my attention was not called to, the following provisions in the same act:

"Sec. 9. x x x

"Each marshal shall have the general authority and powers and be subject to the obligations of United States marshals in the States and Territories. He shall be the executive officer of the court and charged with the execution of all processes thereof, and with the transportation and custody of prisoners and insane persons. x x x

"The marshal shall deliver persons duly adjudged insane in the district to the authorities of such asylum or sanitarium as the governor, with the approval of the Secretary of the Interior, may designate, and for the service of the process in connection with and the guarding and transportation of the insane he shall be compensated as

in the case of prisoners."

When a United States marshal transports prisoners, including insane in Alaska, his expenses are paid from the appropriation "Salaries, fees, and expenses of Marshals, United States Courts" under the provisions of law governing such expenses and the regulations of the Department of Justice. And while it is true, that, in the absence of more specific provisions, the general provision for the care and custody of the insane in Alaska would be available to pay his expenses in connection therewith, I think it is clear that Congress did not intend to change the general laws and regulations governing the payment of fees and expenses of marshals of United States Courts in regard to this particular service, but that, on the contrary, it intended that the service should be performed and payment therefor be made in the usual manner, under the Department of Justice and out of an appropriation of that Department.

So far, therefore, as my decision of November 24, 1900, conflicts with the views herein expressed it is hereby modified.

I transmit herewith for your information four copies of the decision of the Comptroller of the Treasury dated October 9, 1901, in regard to the expenditure of the appropriation in the Act of June 6, 1901 (31 Stats., 322), for the care and maintenance of persons legally adjudged insane in the District of Alaska.

From this opinion it will be observed that, in reviewing his decision of November 24, 1900, construing said Act, he reaches the following conclusion:

"When a United States marshal transports prisoners, including convicts, his expenses are paid from the appropriation "Salaries, fees, and expenses of Marshals, United States Courts" under the provision of law governing such expenses and the regulations of the Department of Justice, and while it is true, that, in the absence of more specific provision, the general provision for the care and custody of the insane in Alaska would be available to pay his expenses in connection therewith, I think it is clear that Congress did not intend to change the general laws and regulations governing the payment of fees and expenses of marshals of United States courts in regard to this particular service, but that, on the contrary, it intended that the service should be performed and payment therefor be made in the usual manner, under the Department of Justice and out of an appropriation of that Department."

"So far, therefore, as my decision of November 24, 1900, conflicts with the views herein expressed it is hereby modified."

In view, therefore, of the conclusions thus expressed by the Comptroller, I have to advise you that so much of Department letter of December 29, 1900, as directed you to call to the atten-

tion of the several United States marshals in and for the District of Alaska to the fact- that under section 9 of the act of June 6, 1900, for the expenses incurred by them for service of process in connection with and the guarding and transportation of the insane of Alaska to the Asylum selected for the accommodation of such persons, they are to be compensated as in the case of prisoners, and vouchers in triplicate covering such expenses should be prepared and forwarded for your approval and thereafter by you transmitted to this Department for adjustment, is hereby canceled and revoked.

Copies of this communication, together with copies of the opinion of the Comptroller in the premises should at once be forwarded by you to the United States marshals in and for the district of Alaska.





In view of the scarcity of bids for the care and treatment of the insane in answer to the advertisements which were sent out, and also in view of the higher price now contracted for, would it not be well to have the law amended so as to allow a greater latitude in regard to the length of time, and as the number of patients is almost sure to be augmented each year, would it not best to contract with parties within the bounds of the District?

If we cannot board our patients at any of the State Institutions in Washington, Oregon or California it is not likely that any private Institution in these States will bid any lower than a similar establishment here. The transportation and the Marshal's fees are heavy.

I therefore, respectfully suggest, that if these views meet with your approval that Mr. Warner, Chairman of the Committee on the Revision of Laws, be requested to put through the following amendment, and see that it becomes a law.

In connection with the above, I have to advise you that copies of the contract in question have been transmitted to the judges of divisions Nos. 1, 2, and 3, of the United States District Court of Alaska, with the request that the same be forwarded to the proper officials of their respective districts, and that instructions be issued to them that before taking any insane persons to the Sanitarium Co., they will procure transcripts in duplicate of the court records as to the persons legally adjudged insane, retaining one copy for delivery at the institution, together with the medical certificate, which is similar to that used for persons confined in the Government Hospital for the Insane, and forward the other copy of the transcript to you for your files.

Upon receipt of such evidence as to the insanity of the persons mentioned therein, you will make a record of such fact and advise the Department.

I enclose herewith a copy of the Act of January 27, 1905, entitled "An Act to provide for the construction and maintenance of roads, the establishment and maintenance of schools, and the care and support of insane persons in the district of Alaska, and for other purposes," and have to advise you that a deficiency estimate amounting to \$17,232 for the care of such insane for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1906, has been forwarded to the Congress and has been included in the Sundry Civil Act.


