

Referring to your letter of April 1, 1909 concerning the legality of shipments of parts of game animals from this District, and advising this office that on the Ste. NORTHWESTERN clearing from this port on the morning of April 1st, 1909 was a consignment of one hundred (100) pairs of snow shoes shipped by the Alaska Commercial Company to the Seattle Hardware Company of Seattle, Washington; that the snow shoes were constructed chiefly of moose hide and are manufactured by the Natives of Western Alaska, and that you caused the shipment to be detained at this port and would hold the same pending this office's decision of the matter, I have the honor to inform you that I promptly telegraphed the same date to Governor F. B. Hoggatt, Washington, D. C. as follows:-

"Have you taken action Collector's letter February sixth re game laws? See Collector's letter Secretary Agriculture November twenty-eighth nineteen eight and Collector McCabe's reply March fifteenth? Collector reports Northwestern clearing from this port on day consignment hundred pairs snow shoes shipped by Alaska Commercial Company to Seattle Hardware Company, Seattle. Shoes constructed chiefly moose hide, manufactured by natives Western Alaska. Collector caused shipment detained this port pending decision this office".





My dear Mr. Humphrey:-

I am just in receipt of your letter of the 27th ultimo, and am glad to have your suggestions regarding the expenditure of the appropriation for the protection of game in Alaska.

Your suggestions and my ideas tally very closely. The difficulty that I anticipate is in getting the right kind of men to do the work. I shall use my utmost endeavors, however, to find suitable men and get some results from this appropriation.

The appropriation not being available until July 1st, it will be impossible for me to put anyone in the field until that time, so that the wardens on the Kenai and Alaska Peninsulas will only be there during the moose hunting season.

I do not anticipate much difficulty in enforcing the game laws against non-resident hunters, as we have a fairly effective control over shipments of trophies now, through the Custom Office. The difficulty will be with our own population, and particularly in the interior where I am reliably informed a great deal of moose and caribou meat reaches the market at Fairbanks.

Since the passage of the Alaska Game Law the Custom officials in Alaska have used their utmost endeavors to enforce it.

My difficulty will be in getting men who will perform effective service. I find that in many instances those in whom one has considerable confidence will not always perform their duty after getting on the government payroll.

I have no blank application forms for hunting licenses. Those desiring to hunt write a letter stating the part of Alaska intended to be visited, the character of the game to be hunted and forwarding the fee for the license desired.

I have the honor to forward herewith copy of a letter from Mr. Charles Goldstein, residing in Juneau, and a dealer in raw furs, regarding the shipment of brown and grizzly bear skins from Alaska.

This inquiry is in line with numerous others which I have received, and I respectfully request to be informed by the Department whether the brown bear referred to in Section 3 of the Act of Congress approved May 11, 1908, entitled, "AN ACT To amend an Act entitled, 'An Act for the protection of game in Alaska, and for other purposes,' approved June seventh, nineteen hundred and two." refers to all classes of brown bear, or only to the Kadiak species.

The Bill as originally drafted by the Department did not prohibit the killing of bear at any season of the year. This Bill failed to become a law during the 59th Congress, and was re-introduced at the First Session of the 60th Congress so changed as to provide a closed season for the Kadiak Brown Bear. This provision was introduced by Mr. Humphrey of Washington, who was looking after the Bill in the House, and my understanding with him was that there was no intention to protect any other species of bear, except the large brown bear, commonly known as the Kadiak, and the bill was so worded. As it passed Congress, it seems to have made no distinction between the

various brown bear in Alaska, and if this section is held to apply to all species of brown bear in this territory, it will work considerable hardship upon the natives who have been in the habit of killing this animal and selling its skin.

Referring to your letter of the 5th instant regarding estimate of the amount necessary for game warden service in Alaska for the next fiscal year, I have to state that on May 5th, 1909, I submitted to the Secretary of the Treasury an estimate for \$10,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1911. This estimate was submitted with the regular estimate of appropriations submitted each year by me to the Secretary of the Treasury. So far as I am at present advised this sum will be sufficient.

Under the present appropriation I have appointed two game wardens for the Kenai Peninsula; one for the Alaska Peninsula and one for the interior of Alaska. These wardens will I trust within the first year of their service be able to furnish the Governor of the Territory with sufficient accurate data regarding the game as to enable him to make suitable recommendation for further protection of the game next year.



Referring to your communication of the 12th inst. regarding detention of four brown bear skins at Skagway, Alaska, I have to inform you that the Act of Congress, approved May 11, 1908, requires that a license fee of \$5.00 per skin be paid for exportation of brown bear skins, and the Department of Agriculture has ruled that this applies to all species of brown bear in Alaska. It will be necessary therefore that you secure a license for the exportation of these skins. Upon receipt of \$20.00, the amount of license fees, I will issue permits for the exportation of the brown bear skins detained at Skagway.
