I have received from the Department a copy of the contract and bond signed by you for the construction of the Executive Mansion at Juneau, Alaska. It is noted that the time for completion is fixed at December 1, 1912.

I do not know whether Mr Harmon has ever told you so I think that it is fair that you know that he has the contract for erecting a dwelling near the Governor's house and has men working on the same. In the event that the time limit or cost limit is exceeded on the Executive Mansion the Department will be informed that your foreman took outside work and this will be taken into consideration in any recommendations that I make to the Department. I am not saying that Mr Harmon is giving time to his work that should go on the Government work but he is personally interested in his own contract of course and it is due you that you be in full possession of the facts when it comes time to settle in full for the work.

It is not at all certain that you are going to complete the work on schedule time or for the cost stated and I think you should not be handicapped by anything like the

conditions stated above.

Referring to the fact that the Government is furnishing the materials for the construction of the Juneau, Alaska, Executive Mansion, your attention is respectfully directed to the following:

There is, inevitably, in any construction, small purchases to be made immediately to avoid undue delay to the work. This building is no exception to this rule and authority is requested to make these purchases and pay for same by voucher on the disbursing agent without submitting proposals and without waiting for specific instructions to the disbursing agent for authority to pay each individual voucher as is now being done. These purchases are made after personal inquiry and secured from the dealer selling at the lowest price and at a cost to the Government as low as though written proposals had been submitted.

It is desirable that the work be expedited as much as is possible during the favorable weather expected in September and October and this arrangement will be a means to that end. The interests of the Government will be fully served and your office relieved of some work if these emergency expenditures can be made as the work progresses and the necessity for same arises.

It is respectfully suggested that the Disbursing Agent be authorized to pay a total not to exceed \$500.00 of vouchers signed by me and accompanied by receipted bills from dealers without waiting for specific instructions to pay each individual voucher thereby obviating much telegraphic correspondence and expediting the work.

In view of the time necessary for the mail, please telegraph if favorable consideration is given to this suggestion and also telegraph instructions necessary to the Disbursing Agent.

Sir:-

Following is a report of the progress of work on the
Juneau, Alaska, Executive Mansion:

The exterior wood work is completed except as follows:
Columns, ceiling, flooring and coping of portico together with a
small amount of siding. All balustrades and basement frames are
yet to be placed and piazza is to build. No sash have been placed.

The painting has kept pace with the work insofar as the
weather conditions would permit. All finishing lumber, including
siding was given one coat of paint before being placed and practi-
cally all has two coats at this time.

The sheet metal work on exterior is completed except flash-
ings on bay windows and that in connection with piazza together
with deck of portico and all downspouts. It was recently decided
to make the downspouts of copper to conform to the balance of the
metal work. This necessitated buying additional material which
has been done.

The concrete foundation walls and the chimneys above the
roof have a coat of stippled stucco in which is embedded a woven
wire fabric fastened rigidly to the rough work. The basement win-
dow and door sills are of concrete.

The grading of the site on the Indian street side of Cal-
houn road is 80% completed. The grading of Calhoun road in front
of the building will be done by the City of Juneau as soon as the
same is cleared of buildings. This is now being done, the only
building of any importance to move being that occupied by teachers
in the native schools. Telegraphic authority to do this work was
recently received.

Lathing is in progress on the first floor which is now per-
haps 40% completed. The entire second floor is lathed and plaster-
ing is now in progress. The two servants' rooms and halls on third
floor have been plastered. The balance of this floor has the stud
partitions in place and joists furred ready for lathing. This part
of the building was not considered when purchasing materials and
letting contract for labor as it was thought at that time that the
appropriation was insufficient to permit of the finishing of the
entire third floor. This will be the subject of a later communica-
tion as it is now thought that some work can be done on this floor.

All basement concrete floors and one area stair are in place

and ceiling furred ready for lathing.

The roughing for electric work is practically completed except outside service conduits which cannot be placed until the grading of Calhoun Road is completed. All wires will be in iron conduits with standard boxes at all outlets with the circuits controlled as shown on the plans.

The drainage and vent system is completed from the sewer to roof with all branches except one short run in basement ceiling. In this work drainage fittings and standard galvanized pipe has been used except in one or two minor instances. The system under the concrete floors and to sewer is extra heavy cast iron pipe and fittings.

The water piping is practically complete except branches in toilet rooms and is as contemplated by the plans and specifications with a few minor variations.

All steam risers to second and third floors and all piping that will be concealed are in place and covered and the steam mains have been erected insofar as that work could be done prior to setting of boiler. The boiler is enroute from Seattle, Wash., and will arrive within the next few days. The radiation has not been shipped. Negotiations with Crane Company, who are furnishing it, are under way looking to an increase of the order. This will be the subject of a communication at an early date.

In installing the mechanical equipment it has been kept in mind that the building should be completed in the quickest possible time and where same varies from the plans or specifications it was to permit the work to proceed with no delay. These variations are of a very minor character and do not in any way affect the work. All piping has been tested and is drop tight.

The floors of the toilet rooms above the basement will be of tile with tile base laid on a concrete slab.

The weather conditions have been very unfavorable for doing exterior work on account of the almost incessant rain.
