This office acknowledges receipt of your favor of January 23d, calling attention to the apparent duplication of Serial Number 780 by Local Board No. 3, City of Juneau, Juneau, Alaska. It is observed, as you indicate in your letter, a copy of which is hereto attached, that Serial Number 780 was first assigned to Charles Irving Ferdine, on the original Form 101 executed by this board, and later was given to David Newquist; but, upon carefully examining the records of this office, it is found that this does not constitute a duplication for the following reason: The Form 101 dated October 20, 1917, contained the list of serial numbers assigned prior to the receipt of your telegram Number A-386, requiring all of the registration cards which showed, on their faces, home addresses in other States and Territories to be mailed to the Adjutants General of such States and Territories. When this order was complied with approximately 300 cards were mailed, by this board, to the Adjutants General of other States and Territories. This so badly broke the consecutive order of the serial numbers, as they appeared on the original Form 101, that it became necessary to make out a completely new revised list, which was executed on January 11, 1918.

David Newquist was registered by Local Board No. 3, about the time the Revised Form 101 was finished; therefore, he was given Serial Number 780, and his name also was placed on the Revised Form 101 and given Serial Number 780, in proper sequence. It evidently was a mistake, or, at least, not necessary for the board to forward a Supplementary Form 101 to your office under these circumstances, as the board had been instructed to send two copies of Form 101 to this office, one of which was for transmission to you.

The object in ordering this done was to examine the list, and determine that instructions had been complied with before sending the list to your office.

It is observed, however, that with reference to a few cards on which the addresses were shown to be in Hawaii and the Philippine Islands, the board apparently failed to understand the import of instructions, and included them in the revised list. A copy of the revised list has been forwarded to you, and, no doubt, you have received it ere this.

With reference to the cards which showed addresses in Hawaii and the Philippine Islands, it is believed that these men are still in this locality, and, rather than incur the additional time and expense required to remake Form 101 again, this office decided that it would ask permission from you to transfer these cases under Sections 141 and 144, S.S.R., if necessary, instead of again remaking the list.
