SUBJECT: Application of Demetrios Mikros, (Jim Mikros), for cancellation of his registration.

1. This office returns to you, herewith, papers in the case of Demetrios (Jim Mikros), who made application to your Board, on November 30, 1917, to cancel his registration, on the ground that he was not twenty one years old on the date he registered, and that he was born in Mavromation, Community Thespion, Kingdom of Greece, in the year 1898, of Greek parents.

2. Upon careful and mature consideration of the evidence submitted by this registrant, this office has decided that the evidence is insufficient to warrant the cancellation of his registration. It will be noted that no legal evidence, whatever, is filed in support of his claim, except his own affidavit which stands alone, and which is, in itself, not very clear, in that it fails to state the month and day of the year 1898, on which he claims to have been born. It will also be observed that the certificate which he filed with this affidavit is that of the Greek Consul at Seattle, Washington, who states in this certificate, that upon the submission to him of certificate No. 211 of the Mayor of the Community of Thespion, dated the 7th day of May 1913, he issued the certificate signed by him. This, of course, is hearsay evidence. Hearsay is admissible to establish certain issues, among which are marriages, births and deaths; but when the decision of a question depends wholly upon hearsay evidence, it should be corroborated by other convincing facts or circumstances. There is no evidence of the authenticity of the alleged certificate which was presented to the Greek Consul, and upon which he based his certificate, and there is no evidence that it was issued by the proper official in Greece, who had charge of the records of births in the community in which the registrant claims he was born.

This evidence would not be considered in any Court in the World and it is not believed, in view of the manifest attempts of many registrants of foreign birth to escape the Selective Draft, that any evidence which is not legal in its nature, clear and convincing, should be considered by this office for the purpose of cancelling a registration.

3. Another consideration which is strictly against the registrant is the fact, that, he declared himself to be within the registration age when he registered, this positive declaration of his to which he attached his signature is supported by the presumption that all men know and understand the legal import of their actions, and that ~~they~~ do nothing which they know to be prejudicial to their own rights and interests, it therefore, follows, that in the absence of clear and convincing proof to the contrary, this registrant is conclusively presumed, as the consequence of his acts, to be within the registration age.

2. Your attention is particularly directed to enclosure No. 10, which quotes a telegram sent by Jack Sutherland to William Britt, January 19th, as follows:

"Citizens of Norway desire information appeal seeking release United States military service, (signed) Jack Sutherland, Secretary Alaska Labor Union."

and also quoting Britt's reply, dated January 21st, as follows: "Citizens of Norway not to be drafted if registered as such writing, signed William Britt".

3. You will note that Murphy's telegram says that, "Britt wrote letter exact copy of which appeared in Bulletin sent you and also sent clipping from Juneau paper." You will also note that Murphy says, "Sutherland initiated inquiry on request of Norwegian members of union." These telegrams establish, beyond question, the fact that Britt

knew, at the time he sent to Sutherland the letter published in the Labor Union Bulletin, that Sutherland was acting on behalf of registrants who desired the information for guidance in making out their questionnaires and appealing from decisions of Local Board. This establishes, beyond doubt, that the purpose and intention of the communication was to induce Norwegian declarants to claim deferred classification on the ground of alienage. This clearly establishes a case of using the mails unlawfully, within the meaning of Sections 1 and 3, Title 12 of the Espionage Act, and establishes a case of wilful attempt to obstruct the recruiting service through the Selective Draft, under Section 3, Title 1 of said act. The affidavit of Oscar Gotfrid Anderson supplied the link necessary to establish a case of actual obstruction of the Selective Draft under Section 3; but, of course, this affidavit is now useless. It is hoped, however, that we will be able to discover other evidence to take the place of that of Anderson.

4. You will also particularly note the signed article by Britt, enclosure 15. In the sixth paragraph thereof he says: "I also wrote to Mr. J. Sutherland of Anchorage, who acted as representative for people there who were claiming exemption." This also shows that he knew that, at the time he mailed the letter complained of, Sutherland was acting on behalf of registrants. You will also observe the entire tone and tenor of this article. It shows a vicious attempt to discredit the officials who instituted the investigation against Mr. Britt. In this connection, it may be stated that, it is believed, this article was directed at the Governor's office, as Britt did not, it is thought, then know that the charges were originated by the Local Board and the Council of Defense at Anchorage. A further fact, in this connection, is: On March 25, 1918, Britt announced himself as a candidate for nomination as Territorial Senator, on the Democratic ticket, at the primary election to be held here April 30th. You will observe that the charges against Mr. Britt could have had no political significance, as the letter from John H. Robinson and T. D. Dwyer, members of Local Board No. 10, to United States District Attorney, Third Division, was dated February 25, 1918, while the letter from J. L. Waller, Secretary of the Anchorage Council of Defense, was dated February 20, 1918, the telegram of Mr. Munley, United States Attorney, Valdez, to this office, was dated February 20, 1918, and the letter of Mr. Murphy, his assistant at Anchorage, was dated February 25, 1918. Thus, it is seen, the investigation was well under way before it was ever known that Mr. Britt was a candidate for office.

5. Local Board No. 4, at Ketchikan, Local Board No. 5, at Petersburg, and Local Board No. 10, at Anchorage, have jurisdiction over a large number of aliens and alien declarants, especially of Norwegian nationality. Therefore the reports from these boards have especial significance. The reports from all Local Boards in the Territory seem to clearly demonstrate that all alien declarants have made an effort to exempt themselves from military duty on the ground of alienage. These reports are, however, incomplete, for the reason that they were based upon only partial returns of questionnaires. As soon as all of the questionnaires are in, this office will cause to be compiled a complete report giving these details from all boards.

6. About eleven o'clock on the morning of April 10th John B. Marshall, Secretary of the Juneau Territorial Council of Defense, called the Executive Officer of this office over the telephone, and requested him to attend a meeting of the Council of Defense to be held at Marshall's office at two o'clock of that day. The Executive Officer inquired as to the object of the meeting and Mr. Marshall informed him that he, himself, had not been informed of its purpose. However, the Executive Officer attended the meeting, and learned that it was called at the request of Mr. Britt, who stated that he desired to vindicate himself. He further stated that he had been informed, officially, from Washington that he was persona non grata to the Government as Vice-Consul to Norway, and also stated that charges had been preferred against him by the Executive Officer. He made a long, somewhat rambling, statement during the course of which he said that he had written the letter to Sutherland, but that he did not know what Sutherland wanted with it. He also stated that he was acting under instructions from the Norwegian Consul General. Britt's statements were taken down in shorthand, but this office has been unable, as yet, to secure a copy of the transcribed notes. The secretary of the Council of Defense has promised, however, to transcribe it, and as soon as it is received, a copy of it will be mailed to you. This office will also mail to you copies of the certified documents to which Murphy's telegram refers, and keep you advised of any other important developments.

7. In conclusion, it is desired to impress upon you the necessity of giving to this office all the support, afforded by the means at your command, in order to insure just results in the prosecution of cases of this character. The article which appeared by Mr. Britt in the Alaska Daily Empire, April 13th, demonstrates the willingness of a portion of the press of the Territory to be used for the

purpose of furthering the ends of this class of people in the attempt to discredit the officers who are exerting every effort to perform their duties to the Government; and the civil officials here have not been found any too willing to lend a sympathetic ear to reports of this kind. There are three unfortunate elements which, in spite of the duty of every American citizen to support the duly constituted representatives of the Government at this time, enter into all inquiries of this nature. These elements were aptly described to the Executive Officer, by James H. Russell, a member of the Executive Committee of the Juneau Territorial Council of Defense, when he said, in substance: "I am afraid that the work of our organization will not be a success. Every time anything of importance arises, it is blocked by one of three considerations--business, politics or lodge." There seems to be a great deal of truth in this statement.
