Subject: Publication by the "Fairbanks News-Miner" and the "Alaska Daily Empire" of articles calculated to discredit and injure the administration of the Selective Draft.

1. In view of recent developments, it is believed that your office should be fully advised as to the attitude of certain portions of the press of this Territory, particularly of the "Fairbanks News-Miner" and the "Alaska Daily Empire", daily newspapers published at Fairbanks and Juneau respectively. I shall try to give you a brief narrative of facts which should place clearly before your mind the attitude of these two newspapers.

2. For approximately eighteen months there has been waged in this Territory the most bitter factional political struggle I ever witnessed. Notwithstanding the duty of all American citizens, at this time, when the country is confronted by a crisis which threatens its very existence, to forget petty politics and merge all personal differences in the paramount necessity for presenting to the common enemy a united front, socially, politically, and economically, I am sorry to note this has not been done in Alaska. Certain members of the political faction opposed to Governor Strong, have gone to inconceivable lengths in their efforts to discredit him in the eyes of the public. Pursuing this end, some members of the press have not scrupled to indulge in the publication of articles which, while not directly aimed at the draft, necessarily result in discrediting it, by bringing the officers charged with its administration, and their official acts in administering the law, into disrepute in the eyes of the community. One of the first instances of this, which has come to my attention, appeared in the editorial columns of the "Fairbanks News-Miner", issue of February 8, 1918, under the head, "One Busy Man." This editorial criticized the action of the Governor in communicating to Local Board No. 17, Fairbanks, the substance of your telegram No. A-3504, canceling voluntary induction by Local Boards 9, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, and 21. In telegram No. 72, this office informed

your office of the approximate expense of the unit cost of inducting men from these boards, and you replied, telegram No. A-3504, instructing that right of induction by these boards be immediately canceled, which was done. When this telegram was received by the board, it immediately wired the Governor protesting that the registrants in its jurisdiction were being discriminated against. The Governor quoted this telegram to you in his telegram No. 74, you again replied, your telegram No. A-3764, that owing to the extraordinary expense of transporting registrants inducted by the interior boards such action could not be authorized on the part of those boards. Later, this office received a telegram from the board advising that several of its registrants were going out at their own expense, and that money was being made up for the purpose of defraying the expense of others, and this telegram, or the substance of it was repeated to you in telegram No. 80 from this office. This correspondence is referred to merely for the purpose of calling your attention to the utter wantonness, and baselessness of the editorial referred to. However, the editor of this paper, who was a strong partisan against Governor Strong, evidently thought he could use the incident to Governor Strong's disadvantage politically; therefore, he immediately set about writing this editorial, which not only has no basis in fact, but is absolutely inaccurate and untrue from beginning to end. Its purpose, as demonstrated on the face of it, was to hold up to ridicule the official acts of the Governor in administering the Selective Service Law, when he had followed, literally, your instructions, and when he had performed his conscientious duty in standing between the Government and the tremendous expense of the unit cost of transporting men from the interior, at a time when it was unnecessary to incur such an expense. The "Fairbanks Citizen" also published a short editorial similar, in tone, to the one herewith enclosed, enclosure No. 1. I refer to the editorial of the "Citizen", however, merely incidentally, as it will be necessary to again refer to it during the course of this narrative. I have no information of any other article of this character having been published by the "News-Miner".

3. The "Alaska Daily Empire," of which John W. Troy was and is the editor and publisher, has, perhaps, been the most bitter in its attack upon Governor Strong of any paper in the Territory, and, in its efforts to discredit him, has been less scrupulous than any other. This paper, so far as this office is informed has never lost an opportunity to hold up to ridicule and public scorn Governor Strong and all other officials charged with the administration of the Selective Draft. This has been done not merely in their private capacity, as citizens, but with reference to the official acts of those against whose official record in the administration of the draft absolutely no adverse criticism can be made. This paper, in its issue of March 1, 1918, reproduced

verbatim the editorial entitled, "One Busy Man", from the "Fairbanks News-Miner"; and it also reproduced the editorial from the "Citizen", at Fairbanks, near the same date.

4. Here it is proper to direct your attention to another phase of the attitude of the "Alaska Daily Empire". This paper never, at any time, gave publicity to any of your telegrams or instructions, or other matters pertaining to the Selective Draft, unless it was absolutely compelled to do so because of the intrinsic news value of the items published. This had been the attitude of this paper for months, at the time I was commissioned and assigned to duty at the Governor's office in connection with the Selective Draft, on the 4th day of December, 1917. Observing the attitude of the paper, and realizing the immense importance to the public of giving as much publicity as possible to many of the instructions which you were sending out at that time, I wrote to the editor of the "Alaska Daily Empire", enclosing an item to which I requested him to give publicity, and, at the same time, calling his attention to the fact that items of vital importance both to the public and to the Government, in the administration of the Selective Draft, were arising almost daily in the Governor's office, and asking that a representative of the paper be sent to the office daily to secure these items. A copy of this letter is herewith enclosed, enclosure No. 2. Several days passed before there was any response to the letter, but, finally a day or so before Christmas the local reporter of the paper called at my office and stated that because of the Christmas rush of advertising which he was also handling, it would be impossible for him to call at the Governor's office daily until after the first of January. He then requested me to see that such items as it was desired to give publicity to were delivered to the office of the "Daily Empire" until after the first of the year, when he would make it a point to call daily for items concerning the Selective Draft. I agreed to this arrangement; and every afternoon, after work hours, I called at the office of the "Daily Empire" and gave it such items as I thought it was necessary to publish. This paper goes to press in the afternoon, while its competitor is a morning paper, and it soon became very much dissatisfied with this arrangement for the reason that its competitor, the "Alaska Daily Dispatch", always called at the office, during the day, for news concerning the Selective Draft. The result was that the "Dispatch" nearly always had the news first, for the reason that the "Empire" did not get it until about press time or until it was off the press in the afternoon. In order for me to have given the items to the "Empire" first it would have been necessary for me to interrupt the regular routine of my work and to rush down to the "Empire" office with messages, as they were received, at odd times during the day. This I could not afford to do, and so explained to the news editor of the "Empire." The news editor gradually became less and less interested, until finally

he informed both myself and one of my clerks that it would not be necessary for us to bring anything more down to the paper, and that he would copy from the "Dispatch" such items as he considered to be absolutely necessary for his paper to handle, because of their news value, and that he did not care to handle any other items. No representative of this paper ever called at this office, for the purpose of eliciting news relative to the Selective Draft, more than twice or three times since my connection with the office. These facts become more significant in connection with the facts which follow.

5. On the 33d day of March, 1918, this office sent you telegram No. 94, quoting a portion of a letter signed by William Britt which had appeared in the "Anchorage Labor Union Bulletin", and calling your attention to the fact that Local Board No. 10, Anchorage, had complained that this article was interfering with the administration of the Selective Draft. On the 5th day of April, 1918, this office sent you, by mail, a complete detailed report of all data concerning this case in its hands at that time. Either that night, or the night following, I met the Honorable John Rustgard, a prominent attorney of Norwegian birth, in the post office, and he called me aside and informed me that William Britt had just come to him and stated that John W. Troy had told him, that afternoon, that I had preferred charges against Britt at Washington. On April 10th a meeting of the Juneau Territorial Council of Defense was held at the instance of Britt, when he again stated that he had been advised, from private sources, that I had preferred charges against him, and requested the Council of Defense to vindicate him. On the 13th day of April, 1918, there appeared in the columns of the "Alaska Daily Empire" a signed communication by Britt, enclosure No. 3, which, beyond question, was an insidious attack upon the officials charged with the administration of the Selective Service Law, with a view to creating sympathy in his behalf and thereby obstructing the course of justice. Your attention particularly is directed to the head lines of this article. It is self-evident, on the face of the article, that these head lines were written by the editor of the paper. If I am correct, in this assumption, there can be no doubt that, in his zeal to discredit the officials charged with the administration of the Selective Draft, the editor, either through ignorance of the true facts, or by wilful design, again held up to ridicule and public scorn the acts of those officials, in an apparent attempt to thwart them in the performance of their duties. On April 17, 1918, there appeared in the editorial column of the "Alaska Daily Empire", an editorial entitled, "William Britt", enclosure No. 4. It will be observed that this article is not merely an attempt to justify Mr. Britt, in the eyes of the community, but it is a direct and unqualified attack upon the good faith of the officers in charge of the Selective Draft in this Territory. The first

sentence in the second and last paragraph thereof reads as follows: "If the Empire has any proper conception of the people of Alaska they will not permit such a man to be destroyed by attacks delivered in the dark and supported only by inuendo." This was published, as it shows upon its face, and as the article of the 13th shows, after the editor of this paper had full knowledge that Mr. Britt was under investigation by the Department, and there can be but one logical construction placed upon it, and that is: It is a direct attempt to obstruct the official acts of those whose duty it is to bring to justice malcontents, and others engaged in the dissemination of disloyal propoganda for the purpose of obstructing the administration of the Selective Draft. In view of the facts already stated, another editorial, which appeared in the "Daily Empire", issue of April 20, 1918, is somewhat illuminating. This article is entitled, "Let The People Know." I have underscored the words which, in my judgment, show a continuous insidious attempt, on the part of the editor of this paper, to place every obstacle in the way of the administration of the Selective Draft, unless it be administered by persons of his own choosing and whom he deems to be in sympathy with his purposes politically. This editorial is enclosure No. 5. I am confident, and the people of this community who have followed the course of events, believe that the underscored lines were directed at me personally; for the reason that, as everybody knows, no appointees of Governor Strong will be left in office, unless Governor Riggs sees fit to renew their appointments, when, of course, they would become his appointees and not those of Governor Strong. While I am not an appointee of Governor Strong, it is probably known to the editor of this paper that he recommended my appointment at the time I was commissioned; and, evidently, this is the fact to which he refers, and this fact he seeks to connect with the prosecution of William Britt. On April 27th, the "Alaska Daily Empire" published an article, enclosure No. 6, written in the Norwegian language, which purports to quote William Britt, and which is important, in this connection, only in that it states that he is the Norwegian Vice-Consul for Alaska, a fact which evidences bad faith on the part of Britt and of which the editor, had he desired to act in good faith in supporting the officials of the Territory in the administration of the law, must have known, if he took any precaution whatever to ascertain the contents of the article before publishing it; and it can hardly be believed that an editor would publish an article, of this kind, at a time when the country is overrun by spies, without knowing its contents. Enclosure No. 7, was clipped from the news columns of the "Alaska Daily Empire", issue of April 26, 1918, and enclosure No. 8, was clipped from the columns of the same paper, issue of April 27, 1918. These articles are important only insofar as they show the consistent effort on the part of the editor of this paper to discredit the work of all officials charged with the administration of the Selective Draft.

6. It would seem that there should be some means of preventing a deliberate and wilful policy, on the part of a newspaper, such as evidently appears in this case, from continually attempting, in this way, to obstruct the work of officials who are conscientiously trying to perform their duties. If there is a remedy, and I am inclined to believe there is, under the "Espionage Act" and the "Trading With The Enemy Act", it surely should be applied. To temporize with persons engaged in carrying out such policies, simply adds fuel to the flames. The language attributed to the Postmaster General, and printed on page 163 of the War Cyclopedia, is peculiarly appropriate to this case. He is credited with having said:

"We shall take care not to let criticism which is personally or politically offensive to the administration affect our action. But if newspapers go so far as to impune the motives of the Government and thus encourage insubordination, they will be dealt with severely. For instance, papers may not say that the Government is controlled by Wall Street or munition manufacturers, or any other special interests. Publications of any news calculated to urge the people to violate law would be considered grounds for drastic action. We will not tolerate campaigns against conscription, enlistments, sale of securities, or revenue collections. We will not permit the publication or circulation of anything hampering the war's prosecution or attacking improperly our allies."

Another excerpt from the War Cyclopedia which seems to apply appears on page 101, and reads as follows:

"Congress may establish a censorship of the press in war time if circumstances render such a measure 'necessary and proper'. For Congress has the power to pass all laws that are 'necessary and proper' to prosecute successfully a war which it has declared; and the subjection of the press to the powers given Congress by the Constitution can hardly be said to abridge the 'freedom there recognized'. Also, of course, Congress may penalize publications which are calculated to stir up sedition, to obstruct the carrying out of the laws, or to 'give aid and comfort to the enemy'".

If this editor, and the few who are in sympathy with him, should succeed in discrediting me either in the eyes of the public or of the Department, the result would be disastrous for any man who might take my place. He would have to bend his every official act to the will of these people, otherwise he would be

subjected to a similar vicious attack. If officers charged with the responsibility of enforcing the Selective Draft are permitted to become the prey of every petty politician who chooses to attack them, for political reasons, the morale of the Selective Service organization will be destroyed, despite the best efforts of the best men who can be placed in charge of the administration of these affairs. It is especially desirable, just now, that the military department be represented in this Territory by men who place duty above personal considerations and who will perform their duties without respect of persons, and this is the very thing which this paper is trying to prevent. It seems to me that, if the editor of this paper would take the trouble to inform himself as to the true facts in a given case, before making such insidious attacks upon the officials charged with the administration of the military affairs of the Territory, he would have no difficulty in furthering the ends of justice, rather than to obstruct them. I take it, that every official act carries with it the necessary presumption that there is sufficient reason and just cause to prompt it, otherwise it would not be made. This especially is true of the acts of military officials, and the public should support them, without criticism unless it is deserved; and this should clearly appear upon the face of the facts, when fully known, before the criticism is made. I have no complaint to make of the truly American and Americanized elements of the community as a whole. They have given the administration of the Selective Draft a whole-hearted support which is highly commendable. I only call attention to definite conditions, relating to certain self-seeking individuals, which, in my judgment, should be corrected for the better interests of the public service.

You will please be governed as nearly as possible, in all future procedure, by the provisions of this instruction.

2. With reference to Henry W. Johanson, I suggest that your board set a definite date to which you are willing to extend the time for him to return his questionnaire. Then notify C. P.
