1. Regarding Hopkins, who was held by the local board at Everett, Washington, we note you state in your wire of the 12th instant that you have received no information as to whether this registrant was found qualified for general military service.

2. Regarding Roberts, we note your statement in the same wire that "he has not reported under Section 137 and nothing can be done until he reports."

3. This office has endeavored in every delinquent case to keep you informed of any information received by us, and therefore have telegraphed you in numerous instances. It is apparent that the procedure prescribed for the handling of delinquent cases under the Selective Service Regulations does not entirely meet conditions with which we have to contend in some instances. You may feel assured that this office will at all times do everything possible to apprehend delinquents. Please advise us as quickly as possible when registrants report, or having been directed to report under delinquent orders issued by this office fail to report to your board by the time specified in such orders.

4. It is unfortunate that there was some misunderstanding between you and Mr. Merrill of the local board at Everett regarding the Hopkins' case. In the Roberts' case, having heard from him, we issued delinquent order Form 1015 giving him until June 8th to report to your board. A copy of that delinquent order was mailed to you.

5. On receipt of your wire of the 12th instant, we have wired to the local board at Everett asking them to advise us whether Hopkins was found qualified for general military service, and to get action in the Roberts' case we have wired to the Adjutant General of the State of Oregon, at Portland, requesting him to have the local board having jurisdiction of Cove, Oregon, order Roberts before them for examination.

6. You will be advised when we hear from these cases.

7. The new quota basis established by the President is calculated on the number of men in Class 1. If you will refer to your answer to our wire No.A-285 of May 11th you will note that you reported you would have no men actually classified and physically examined remaining after filling your first quota. Seward board was the only one in the Territory that so reported. Though we are aware that it is a difficult matter to round up the delinquents under your jurisdiction, we have no doubt that we will be asked for an explanation by the Provost Marshal General, and it behooves us all to work actively to recruit Class 1 to the maximum. Any suggestions which you may make to bring about the desired results, and wherein this office may co-operate, will be appreciated. Kindly let us hear from you at an early date.

1. We note your wire of date stating that you have called men to fill quota.

2. The telegram of May 9, 1918, from this office to your board read as follows:

"No.A-272. First. You are directed immediately to issue Forms 1028 and 1028-a calling your current quota to the colors, and requiring them to report to your board at 10 o'clock on the morning of May 22nd. This applies to those registrants who can be reached in time to report in person on that date. If you have other registrants either at Juneau or Douglas, whose numbers place them within current quota, you may instruct them by wire to report to local board 1, Douglas, or local board 3, Juneau, and mail induction papers to those boards as required by Section 148. Second. If you have registrants whose order numbers place them within current quota, and who are at some point known to you in States, or some other point in Alaska, telegraph them to report to local boards there having jurisdiction of the address at which they reside on the morning of May 22nd at 10 o'clock. Ask them to wire you name of board and immediately mail induction papers to board as required by Section 148. Third. The object of paragraphs two and three is to enable you to call your entire quota in order of their liability for service and give them sufficient time to report for duty. Fourth. For the purpose of making out your induction papers, provided for in Section 148, you will use serial call number 193, as provided by Section 178½, S.S.R. Your quota must be sent to Commanding Officer, Fort William H. Seward, Haines. Wire this office immediately after you finish mailing notices, and sending wires as provided herein. Fifth. This office has made arrangements with Pacific Steamship Company to have City of Seattle call at Ketchikan

"about May 22nd, which will pick up your quota and take them to Fort William H. Seward, Haines."

3. On May 8th your board wired this office as follows:

"We have one registrant San Francisco, California, one Chicago, Illinois, one Monterey, California, one Crescent, B.C., subject to call May 20th. Can we have them report at other camps? Please advise. Rush."

And on May 10th your board wired this office as follows:

"Shall boards in States furnish transportation to Haines or send men to nearest Camp? What about man in Crescent, B.C.? Rush answer."

In reply to the foregoing wires this office cabled to your board on May 10th, as follows:

"No.A-279. Reference yours of 8th relative registrants San Francisco, Chicago and Monterey. Follow instructions contained in telegram No. A-272. Relative registrant at Crescent, B.C., pass over him for present and call another registrant in his stead. Will give you definite instructions relative this registrant within few days."

"No.A-280. Reference yours this date relative boards in States furnishing transportation. You will request these boards to send registrants to nearest mobilization camp. As soon as you know name and address of board having jurisdiction of present place of residence of registrants in States, make out and send to such boards full set induction papers in respect of each registrant, as required in Section 148."

4. On May 13th your board wired this office as follows:

"Quandra cannery pile driver crew five men. All in draft. If taken will shut down cannery. They can report July 1st. Advise. Rush."

In reply to the above this office wired your board on May 16th as follows:

"No.A-325. Reference yours 13th relative crew Quandra cannery pile driver of 5 men. Advise that if impossible to replace these men, induction of three of them be deferred until July 1st, the

"two of least importance should be inducted and the cannery should be notified to secure other men in their place. It certainly should be possible to secure two Indians or other persons who could fill the places of two men engaged in assisting to drive piles. As matter of fact it is the opinion of this office that at least four of men could be replaced in this way, leaving only the foreman, and if this can be done it is much to be preferred, instead of deferring induction of three men."

5. On May 19th this office wired your board as follows:

"No.A-368. In each case whersin you have telegraphed your registrants who are in current quota to appear for induction before other boards, make out and mail Forms 1028 and 1028-a. This must be done in order that the man may be properly certified as a deserter when the time for induction passes."

6. On May 18th we wired your board as follows:

"No.A-349. Government harbor boat 'Peterson' will arrive Ketchikan Tuesday evening May 21st and will sail from there as early on morning of 22nd as drafted men can be entrained. Have them ready for entrainment promptly at 10 o'clock, the hour of assembly. Any festivities which your towns people may have planned in honor of drafted men must be arranged so as to be concluded in time not to interfere with entrainment on morning of May 22nd. Issue to your quota a sufficient number of meal tickets to pay for their lodging and meals at Wrangell one night and at Juneau one night, where they will lay over on their way to the post. It is possible that 'Peterson' may stay at Petersburg night of 23rd, make your issue of meal tickets large enough to cover this contingency. It is important not to overlook this item, as there is no accommodation for feeding and sleeping men aboard boat and they will have to be cared for ashore."

7. On May 20th we wired your board as follows:

"No.A-380. Reference yours 8th instant and our A-279. Facts about registrant in British Columbia submitted to Provost Marshal General and he replied, 'Telegram B-920: No methods have been provided for compelling return of deserters and delinquents from Canada. Suggest board issue induction papers in usual manner and if registrant becomes deserter you endeavor obtain his deportation by Canadian immigration

"authorities, communicating with them direct."

8. On May 22nd this office wired your board as follows:

"No.A-406. Lt. Hanson wires that you are delivering to him 55 men at Ketchikan. This is approximately 17 short of number you wired this office you would deliver. Immediately explain the reason why you did not deliver a larger number of men. If any of those notified to appear for induction failed to do so, immediately have arrested as deserters and call sufficient number to make up deficiency as provided by Section 169, S.S.R. Report to this office fully by wire."

Your board wired this office in reply to the foregoing, on May 23rd, as follows:

"Yours 22nd, No.406. Owing to advanced date of call to colors we were unable to get notice to men on board ships at sea in time for them to be here at 10 A.M. May 22nd. One man reported last night off steamship 'New England.' We have men on 'Tyee' at sea, on 'Watson' at sea, on 'Cedar' at sea, who will report to this board immediately upon landing at this port. THEN OUR QUOTA WILL BE COMPLETE."

On June 4th this office wrote your board as follows:

"Please advise this office by return mail of the completion of the quota ordered for induction last month."

On June 5th this office wired to your board as follows:

"No.A-492. Regarding inductions under Call 193, wire this office immediately exact number of men your board has inducted and who have actually been entrained, to what mobilization places they have gone and the number of men to each mobilization place."

On June 6th your board wired to this office as follows:

"Yours 5th, No.A-492. 54 entrained for Fort Seward to date, 13 men entrained for Camp Lewis, 1 man sent to Camp Grant, Ill, and one man to be sent to Camp Grant when recovered from operation."

Immediately on receipt of the foregoing wire, on June 7th, this office wired your board as follows:

"No.A-501, reference yours 6th. Immediately wire what steps being taken for immediate completion of balance of fourteen men, the number you expect to induct each

"day, to what mobilization places they go, and the number to each."

This office received a wire from your board in reply to the foregoing, under date of June 7th, reading as follows:

"Yours date, No.A-501. 5 men given deferred induction to July 10th; 4 men given deferred induction to October 1st; 1 man on lighthouse tender 'Cedar' reported to captain on May 22nd and will be sent to Haines when 'Cedar' arrives here. Trying to locate four men whom we think are at sea."

This office wired your board on June 8th as follows:

"No.A-510. Your wire 7th regarding selected men. Quota must be furnished by your board as directed in Call 193. You will be governed by the Selective Service Regulations. See sections 158, changes number 1, and 169. Wire this office today what steps you are taking for completion of quota. If necessary, cancel orders of induction for men who are not available and call these men first for next quota."

And on June 12th we wired your board as follows:

"No.A-554. Wire immediately to this office stating date quota will be completed under Call 193. Why has our wire to you 8th, No.A-510, not been answered?"

In reply to the foregoing this office received a wire from your board under date of June 12th, reading as follows:

"Yours date, No.A-554. Have been waiting for notice of entrainment from Local Boards in States. One man coming on 'City of Seattle' and will go on to Haines; one man sent Fort McDowell by Los Angeles board; one man sent Haines by Cordova; John Roche, delinquent 485, will be sent Camp Lewis by Port Angeles. Saw notice in paper that Janggen sent to Macon, Georgia, but have received no word from board of transfer. Five men going Haines July 10th. Waiting decision of Juneau district medical board on Schaffer case since May 11th. This leaves three men lacking. Shall we call three available men out of turn? Registrants are scattered all over Alaska, in canneries and almost impossible to reach at short notice."

Immediately on receipt of your wire of June 12th, this office wired your board, on June 13th, as follows:

"No.A-569, reference yours 12th. Your quota must be inducted according wire sent you by Hunt on May 9th, and in addition thereto you will be guided by section 169, section 158 sub-paragraph a, and wire sent you by Hunt May 7th. Immediately call others to fill your quota. Answer."

The wire of May 7th, above referred to, reads as follows:

"No.A-263. In order to prevent hardship resulting to registrants temporarily employed in seasonal occupations such as fishermen and miners who are necessary to the prosecution of the industry in which they are engaged, and which, if such employment were permanent would entitle them to deferred classification, it is desired that Local Boards defer the induction of all such registrants until the close of the season for the industry in which such registrant is employed. This procedure is covered by SUB-PARAGRAPH A, SECTION 158, S.S.R. This instruction is not to be taken as giving unlimited authority to defer induction of men who may be engaged in the occupation of fishing and mining generally, but must be construed to apply only to such registrants as are absolutely necessary to the industry in which they are engaged, within the meaning of the regulations applicable to necessary industries."

1. We requested you yesterday to give special attention to our wire to Mr. Heneghan about filling the balance of the quota from your board.

2. Our letter on this same subject today quotes for your information the messages sent to your board by this office and your wires to this office on this subject. You will note from the record therein that the call was telegraphed to your board on May 9th; that your board was directed to have your quota report on May 22nd; that the attention of your board was called to the fact that you were delivering approximately 17 men short of quota on May 22nd, and your board was directed to IMMEDIATELY MAKE UP THE DEFICIENCY, AS PROVIDED BY SECTION 169 OF THE SELECTIVE SERVICE REGULATIONS; that your wire of May 23rd to this office indicated that when you secured several men then at sea and whom you expected on the arrival of the "Cedar," "New England," and Tyee," your quota would be completed; that under the dates of June 4th, 5th, 7th, 8th and 12th the attention of your board was repeatedly called to this very important matter; and, furthermore, on receipt of the wire which your board sent under date of the 12th, this office wired your board on the 13th. The last-mentioned cablegram reads as follows:

"No. A-569, reference yours twelfth. Your quota must be inducted according to wire sent you by Hunt on May 9th, and in addition thereto you will be guided by section 169, section 158 sub-paragraph ", and wire sent you by Hunt May 7th. IMMEDIATELY CALL OTHERS TO FILL YOUR QUOTA. Answer."

"C" Adding to "A" the number of Registrants INDUCTED AND CALLED FOR INDUCTION SINCE THE FILLING OF THE FIRST NET QUOTAS, AND PRIOR TO SUCH DATE AS MAY BE ANNOUNCED. With the further addition of the number of VOLUNTARY AND INDIVIDUAL INDUCTIONS.

4. Your attention is called to the fact that the information relative to the number of Voluntary and Individual Inductions is furnished to the Governors of the States and Territories by the Provost Marshal General.

"Upon presentation to a recruiting officer of a certificate by his local board to the effect that his class and order number are so low that he is not within the CURRENT QUOTA of his local board, any registrant may enlist voluntarily in the Navy or in the Marine Corps, and thereafter, upon presentation by the registrant to his local board of a certificate of a commissioned officer of the Navy or Marine Corps stating that he has been so enlisted, such certificate shall be filed with the Questionnaire and the registrant shall be placed in Class V on the ground that he is in the naval service of the United States."

Subject: Enlargement of number of registrants available for general military service.

1. In connection with the new regulations governing the apportionment of quotas, the Provost Marshal General calls attention to the very low and unexplained percentage strength of Class One reported by a number of the Local Boards of the Territory of Alaska. You will appreciate that the figures which each board has furnished to this office and reported by us to the Provost Marshal General have been compared with the averages of all the boards of this territory, as well as other states and territories and the averages for all of the states and territories.

2. Owing to the large number of registrants who are delinquent, on the classification lists of the Local Boards in Alaska, it is clearly apparent that special efforts will have to be exerted to enlarge the number of registrants for general military service. Therefore, first, all boards are requested to put forth every possible effort to apprehend every delinquent whose present whereabouts may be ascertained. In this you will need the help of the United States Marshals and their deputies and the local police, and we would request that you ask them to co-operate and call their attention to the importance of tracing the delinquents and apprehending them.

3. The attention of all boards is called to the number of unfinished cases, and you are requested to consider these cases and settle them at the earliest possible time.

4. You are also requested to review the cases of any and all registrants who have been placed in Limited Group "C" and wherever there may be any doubt in these cases have the registrants brought before the medical advisory board of your district for re-examination. In other cases there may also appear some doubt where men have been classified in other than Class 1, and you are requested to re-examine these.

5. A close scrutiny of the Emergency Fleet List is also requested.

6. When reviewing doubtful cases you will do well to bear in mind the probability that additions and corrections may shortly be ordered by the Provost Marshal General in order that the numbers for Class One may be recruited to the maximum strength.

Would add that one of the members of the Local Board at Juneau today questioned this registrant regarding his failure to report, and he explained that when leaving Alaska for Seattle, Wash., he left with the Postmaster at Haines an address which would reach him in Seattle; that when leaving Seattle he left instructions for the forwarding of his mail from Seattle to Hoonah, Alaska; that he received at the latter place the orders from the Local Board at Haines to report for physical examination, and promptly on receipt of same he came to Juneau and reported as directed. As evidence of the forwarding of mail to him from Haines, this registrant has the foregoing orders in his possession, which were mailed to him at Haines, forwarded to Seattle and re-forwarded to Hoonah. Apparently this registrant did

fail to properly inform the Local Board at Haines, Alaska, of his address each time he moved. This office is in receipt of telegram No. B-1290 from the Provost Marshal General, as follows:

"Please immediately communicate to all local and district boards and give to the press for publication:

One year ago occurred the first registration for military purposes of the young manhood of the Nation. Ten million men responded in a single day. This accomplishment was nothing short of marvelous. The task of utilizing this enormous force seemed unachievable. But the work of classification of this great mass of men power in such a way as to permit of its organization and moulding into an effective army was entrusted to forty six hundred and sixty three local boards and one hundred fifty six district boards constituting a force of nearly fifteen thousand of the leading citizens of every community who assisted in their work by more than one hundred thousand equally patriotic volunteers have performed a work that challenges the attention and excites the admiration of all our people.

Well may we pause today, while another million of our youths enter the lists, and survey the results of the year's work. Each registrant has been examined and his availability for military service has been determined. In other words these millions of men have been classified in such a manner that the Nation may now call for them to come forward into the Army. No call can be so large that it will not be filled immediately whether the number be such as may be filled by those who have been found to stand in the first rank of availability or so great that men standing in the second, third or fourth ranks of availability must go forward. In other words, all these millions of men who one year ago were an inert mass, have become a mobile Army. Each has found his place and each in his proper turn has marched or awaits the order to march.

These results could not have been accomplished except through the devoted and unselfish labor of patriots. The Local and District Boards have scored an unprecedented triumph and have earned the undying gratitude of the Nation. Their achievement is one of the great successes of the war. They have already sent into camp, including those under orders for June mobilization, an army of more than a million and a half men. They have already produced as soldiers one man out of every six registrants and the world stands in profound astonishment as it views this accomplishment.

Compensated poorly if at all, except by the gratitude and affection of their neighbors and of the Nation at large the boards have labored incessantly through the enervating heat of last summer, only to find still greater tasks awaiting their unceasing devotion throughout the rigors of the following winter period. Then, having accomplished the classification they found themselves confronted with the mobilization of millions of men and accurately and promptly they have performed and are performing this labor.

Much work yet remains. Today the new men of twenty one are being registered and must be speedily classified. On the first of next month the Local and District Boards will be invested with the still further responsibility of preventing idleness and of unproductive employment which is not effective to the Nation in the emergency. Some boards will review their work and correct these inequalities which have been unavoidable in so tremendous an undertaking.

The Nation however, with full confidence in the men who have performed these great tasks in the past, faces the future without foreboding. The splendid work of our Local and District Boards and of the other great volunteer army of assistants has filled us with admiration. They have been tried and found true and so long as this war may last our people are happy in the complete assurance that this great organization will not fail the Nation.

Your office is the only one in the territory employing two clerks. Many other boards have a vastly greater number of registrants and in most cases, have no clerical help whatsoever. I trust that you will be able to dispense with at least one clerk by July 1st. I have in mind your letters and telegrams in reference to this matter and my answer of June 10th, but I fail to see, after an examination of the work of your office, any necessity for an additional clerk.

For your information I may state that none of the Local, District, or Medical Advisory Boards in the second and fourth judicial divisions are making any charges against the Government whatsoever; - either for clerical help or for rentals; and that but three boards in the territory are employing clerks. I may add that these three last mentioned boards do not compare in efficiency with the others.

Subject: CHANGES NO. 4, S.S.R., ADDITIONS TO PART V, CLASSIFICATION OF REGISTRANTS WHO ARE IDLERS, ETC.

1. We are forwarding to you by mail today copies of Changes 4, Additions to Part V of the Selective Service Regulations, regarding the withdrawal of deferred classification and order number of registrants who are found to be idlers or engaged in non-productive occupations after July 1st, 1918.

2. We request that each member of Local Boards carefully read these additions to the Selective Service Regulations, and acknowledge receipt to this office.

3. Note that all are charged with observing and investigating cases of registrants who are found to be idle or who may be engaged in occupations or employments defined in these regulations as non-productive occupations, whether your boards have original jurisdiction over such registrants or not. Section 121K defines the principal nonproductive occupations or employments to which the regulations are to be applied at this time, and Section 121L specifies the grounds which are to be accepted by you as reasonable excuses for temporary idleness or for registrants being engaged in nonproductive occupations or employments.

4. The forms to be used in carrying out these regulations will be forwarded to you in due course. Please advise this office if you do not receive them shortly.

5. The changes which are sent you are intended to be placed in the Form 999 (Selective Service Regulations). We believe that if all will do this they will find the Regulations of greater service and the necessity of wiring for information may be avoided in some instances. If additional copies of Changes 1, Changes 2 and Changes 3, which were sent you some time ago, are required, we will be pleased to furnish you additional copies on request. Changes 1 and 2 require cutting and pasting in over the parts which they amend. In addition thereto instructions have been sent you by letter and telegraph from time to time. All amendments should be carefully noted.

1. We note your letter of June 20th, with which you forwarded a report on Form 2002a as of June 20, 1918, and showing 39 men "Inducted and Called for Induction," including the 20 men of your first net quota and 19 registrants enlisted in the Army and the Navy.

2. We invite your attention to subparagraph (c) of Section 9 of the Regulations Governing the Apportionment of Quotas, which reads as follows:

"To the number so reported in the respective States, and the subdivisions thereof, shall be added the number of registrants inducted and called for induction since the filling of the first net quotas of the respective States and subdivisions thereof, under the proclamation of the President, dated July 12, 1917, and prior to the date of the report specified in preceding paragraph (a)."

Inasmuch as no call has been made on Local Boards in Alaska for registrants in excess of the first net quota, there is at this time nothing to report on Form 2002a for registrants "Inducted and called for induction."

3. Please also note the second paragraph of Section 10 of the Regulations Governing the Apportionment of Quotas, which reads as follows:

"The Provost Marshal General shall furnish the Governor of each State a statement of the credits due such State and the subdivisions thereof."

As you were advised in our letter of June 15th, your Board was given credit for Voluntary and Individual Inductions to May 1st, 1918, for 5 men. You will later receive credit for the other men in the service of the Army, but it will not be until the Provost Marshal General has furnished this office a statement of the credits so due you.

1. Having reference to your letter of the twenty-seventh ultimo to Local Board Number Four, Ketchikan, Alaska. You are advised that men subject to the provisions of the Selective Service Act may enter the service only by induction by their Local Boards in accordance with the Selective Service Regulations, except in the instances specified in Section 151 (b), (d), (e), and in certain telegrams, known in the Selective Service Departments as Telegram B-41 of March 7, 1918, and Telegram B-424 of April 9, 1918, from the Provost Marshal General, as to the Army, and as specified in Section 151 (a) as to the Navy or the Marine Corps. The instructions issued by the Provost Marshal General have been communicated to all Local Boards, and registrants may obtain information from the Boards and read such parts of the Selective Service Regulations as may concern them. In connection with Section 151 of the S. S. R., Changes 2 thereof should be noted for paragraphs "d" and "e."

2. Except as provided in calls duly authorized and issued or in accordance with competent induction orders signed by a chief of a corps or a department of the Army, Local Boards cannot effect the induction of registrants.

3. Under the provisions of Section 151, registrants may enlist, without a certificate or a permit from any Local Board, if they conform to certain requirements governing enlistments, in the following branches of the service:

The Signal Enlist Reserve Corps,
The Engineers' Enlisted Reserve Corps,
The Medical Enlisted Reserve Corps,
The Aviation Section,
The Enlisted Reserve Corps of the
Quartermaster's Department.

4. In order to enlist in the Navy or the Marine Corps, men subject to the provisions of the Selective Service Act must present to a Recruiting Officer a certificate from a Local Board that they are not within the current quota of their Board.
