2. Bearing in mind the instructions sent you regarding the
manner in which meal tickets should be handled by you and relative
to the Department Quartermaster to whom such tickets should be
sent by creditors to secure payment, this office fails to understand

why you told the persons to whom you issued these tickets for meals and lodgings furnished to send the tickets to this office for payment.

3. It is observed that you apparently made no effort to check over the charges made by these parties for meals and lodgings. Most of the inaccuracies may be readily found by checking over the bills; but we will call your attention to the following: The dates covering the seven day period during which lodgings were furnished two men on meal ticket No. 324552 are not shown on this ticket. Meal ticket No. 796790 shows that meals were furnished from June 11th to June 14th, although the date of the induction of your quota under call No. 193 was June 24th.

4. By referring to our letter of January 21, 1918, you will observe that you were instructed to

"Be sure to indicate on the back of the meal ticket the location of the Quartermaster designated to pay it, as otherwise the persons furnishing the meals will not know where to mail them."

The memorandum issued by the Provost Marshal General, and which this office sent you, relating to reimbursements to members of boards, inducted men and other persons for expenses incident to the administration of the Selective Service, covers the following:

"Payments for meals and lodgings are made by the Department Quartermasters, as follows:

x x x x x x x x

"Western Department, at San Francisco, California,
for the States of Montana, Wyoming, Utah, Washington,

"Oregon, California, Idaho, and Nevada.
Triplicate copies of meal tickets should
be sent to these Department Quartermasters."

5. Alaska is included in the Western Department, although not specifically included in the foregoing paragraph quoted from the memorandum issued by the Provost Marshal General. Had there been any doubt in the mind of any member of your Board as to what should have been done, you could have wired to this office for instructions before forwarding any of the tickets or having the holders of the originals forward them to this office.

6. We again call attention to part of the instructions contained in our letter of January 21, 1918, reading as follows:

"The instructions on the back of the meal ticket state that the original is to be given to the person furnishing the meal, the duplicate sent to the Dep't Quartermaster, and the triplicate retained by the Chairman of the Board. It will be observed that the duplicate is fastened into the book, while the original and triplicate are perforated. It is therefore suggested that the triplicate be sent to the Dep't Quartermaster instead of the duplicate.

7. You are requested to send this office as soon as you may conveniently prepare same, a statement showing the number of the men inducted by your Board at Anchorage on June 24th and thereafter under Call No. 193, the number who were furnished meals, the number who were furnished lodgings, the time of departure via the "Farragut" and also the time of the departure of your later contingent, the charges for such meals and lodgings, and all the other essential items connected with this matter, and particularly showing that the amount paid per day per man by the

1. I infer from the contents and tenor of your letter of July 8th, in reply to ours of June 21st, 1918, that the suggestions of this office, which have the force of instructions, will be followed by the members of your Board only in case they meet with approval.

2. I admit that a rental price of \$55.00 per month for the office you occupy is fairly reasonable, but I do insist that other equally satisfactory quarters could and should be secured for a much less sum.

3. The necessity for the employment of two clerks must be based either on the failure of the two lay members of your Board to devote any considerable or effective assistance, or to their inability to do so. Members of Local and other Boards are drafted into the service of the United States. If they cannot, because of lack of time or ability, perform their duties, they should be relieved.

4. You state that "as regards the management or methods practiced by other Local Boards you are in no way concerned." This, taken in connection with your continued disregard of the Regulations and the directions of this office, as disclosed by the dilatory record of your board, compels me to request the resignation of Mr. Robinson and yourself, effective August 1st, 1918.

1. Your attention is directed to the following telegram of instructions from the Provost Marshal General, dated July 20, 1918:

"Number B-1971. By recent Act of Congress, citizens or subjects of countries neutral in the present war who have declared their intentions to become citizens of the United States are relieved from liability to military service on certain conditions, in accordance with the regulations prescribed by the President. Pending receipt of these regulations instruct all Local Boards that they shall not involuntarily induct any registrant who is a subject of a country neutral in the present war and who has declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States, but who has not completed his final naturalization. Declarant registrants of the following countries do not come within the terms of this telegram:

SUBJECT: Withdrawal of deferred classification and order numbers of Registrants engaged in non-productive occupations.

The Provost Marshal General, in telegram No. B-1614, dated July 19th, 1918, has directed this office to communicate to all Boards the following:

*You are instructed as follows.

ONE. Paragraph A of Section 122-K does not include Managers, Clerks, Cooks, or other employees unless they are actually engaged in the serving of food and drink, or either.

TWO. The words 'other attendants' in Paragraph B of Section 121-K include Bellboys, and also include porters, unless such porters are engaged in heavy work.

THREE Paragraph C of Section 121-K includes in addition to ushers and other attendants all persons engaged and occupied in games, sports, and amusements, except actual performers in legitimate concerts, operas, or theatrical performances.

FOUR. Paragraph D of Section 121-K does not include public or private chauffeurs, unless they are also engaged in other occupations or employments defined by these regulations as nonproductive.

FIVE. Paragraph A of Section 121-K does not include store executives, managers, superintendents, nor the heads of such departments as accounting, financial, advertising, credit, purchasing, delivery, receiving, shipping, and other departments; does not include registered pharmacists employed in wholesale and retail drug stores or establishments; and does not include travelling salesmen, buyers, delivery drivers, electricians, engineers, carpet layers, upholsterers, nor any employees doing heavy work outside the usual duties of clerks.

SIX. The words 'Sales clerks and other clerks' in Paragraph E of Section 121-K includes the clerical force in the office and in all departments of stores and mercantile establishments.

The words 'stores and other departments'

SEVEN. In Paragraph E of Section 121-K, includes both wholesale and retail stores and mercantile establishments engaged in selling goods and wares.

EIGHT. In addition to the cases where reasonable excuses may be accepted for temporary idleness or for being engaged in nonproductive occupation or employment, Local and District Boards have authority under the regulations to withhold or postpone action for a reasonable time in cases where it appears that the registrant in good faith is, or has been, seeking productive employment, and that such reasonable postponement will enable him to secure such employment.

NINE. Local Boards are instructed to co-operate with the State directors of the United States Employment Service or Local agents of such service when advised of their appointment and location in order that this agency of the Government may be enlisted to assist registrants engaged in nonproductive occupations or employments to obtain work of a productive character as soon as possible and with the least hardship or inconvenience. To this end Local Boards should furnish to such directors or agents the names and addresses of registrants to whom notices to appear have been given; should furnish such directors or agents with the names and addresses of registrants who may inquire for information in respect of a change of employment, and refer all registrants requesting such information to the directors or agents of the United States Employment Service."

This office has also received from the Provost Marshal General Telegram No. B-1885, dated July 19, 1918, reading as follows:

• Communicate to all Boards at once:

ONE Subdivision (C) of Section 121-K Selective Regulations hereby amended as follows 'Persons, including ushers and other attendants, engaged and occupied in and in connection with games, sports, and amusements, excepting owners and managers actual performers, including musicians, in legitimate concerts, operas, motion pictures, or theatrical performances, and the skilled persons who are necessary to such productions, performances, or presentations.'

Subject: INDIANS, REGISTRATION OF HALF-BREEDS AND OTHERS
LIVING SEPARATE AND APART FROM TRIBES.

1. You are directed to notify all registrars under your jurisdiction, at the earliest possible time, to register half-breeds and others who are living separate and apart from tribes and who are leading a civilized life. Instruct registrars not to re-register any who were registered in 1917.

2. For the purpose of accomplishing the registration, excepting those who have become twenty-one years of age since the first registration a year ago, use the same forms that were issued in 1917. Use the new registration forms exclusively for the registration of persons who have reached the age of twenty-one since the first registration in Alaska.

3. Bearing on the subject of the citizenship of Indians, your attention is directed to Section 79, Changes No. 5 S.S.R., and to note 5 thereof, reading in part as follows:

"An Indian is a citizen if x x he lives separate and apart from his tribe and has adopted the habits of civilized life."

4. You are advised that the registration of Indians generally in the Territory of Alaska is still deferred. Register only the half-breeds and others, defined by the foregoing instructions.

Subject: Boyd Leedy's application for commission as First Lieutenant
Engineers Reserve Corps.

1. I am informed that Boyd Leedy, who is at the present time employed as Mine Surveyor, Alaska Railroad Commission, having his headquarters at Anchorage, Alaska, has made application to be commissioned as a First Lieutenant in the Engineers Reserve Corps, and has sent to your department letters of recommendation accompanied by statements as to his qualifications.

2. I would be very much pleased if you would give his case special consideration. There are certain circumstances in connection with this case which are peculiar. During the early part of this year Colonel Frederick Mears, of the Thirty-first Engineers Regiment, requested Mr. Leedy to join that regiment, but owing to the earnest solicitations of Mr. Leedy's immediate superiors, Sumner S. Smith, Federal Mine Inspector, and Division Engineer Wm. H. Gerig in charge of the railway project at Anchorage, Alaska, he did not do so, and he continued on his work as mine surveyor at the Eka and Chickaloon mines operated by the Alaska Railroad Commission along the line of the railroad. Mr. Leedy's superiors speak very highly of his ability and feel that his services are invaluable.

3. If you could use the services of Mr. Leedy, I would be very much pleased if a commission were to issue to him. As indicated, he would have been commissioned ere this, but for the imperative necessity for his services at the coal mines being operated by the Government, and his loyalty to his superior officers.

4. Except for being within the draft age, Mr. Leedy would be qualified for a place with the forty engineers regarding which you recently notified me. He is a registrant of Local Board No. 10, Anchorage, Alaska, order number 546 and serial number 1180.

1. For your information in connection with our letter of July 23, 1918, quoting instructions contained in the Provost Marshal General's telegram No. B-1971 of July 20, 1918. Your attention is invited to the amendment to the Selective Service Act, as published in the Official Bulletin of July 12, 1918, which reads in part as follows:

"A citizen or subject of a country neutral in present war who has declared his intention to become a citizen of the U. S. shall be relieved from liability to military service upon his making a declaration, in accordance with such regulations as the President may prescribe, withdrawing his intention to become a citizen of the United States, which shall operate and be held to cancel his declaration of intention to become an American citizen and he shall forever be debarred from becoming a citizen of the United States."

Subject: British and Canadian Conventions, relating to the service of citizens of the United States in Great Britain and of British subjects in the United States.

1. This office is in receipt of the following instructions from the Provost Marshal General:

"No. B-2199. On July 10, 1918, this office, by telegram No. B-1974, issued following instructions, which also apply to Alaska.

(Paragraph) Senate of the United States recently ratified conventions with Great Britain and Canada relating to the military service of citizens of the United States in Great Britain or Canada, and of British and Canadian subjects in the United States.

(Paragraph) It should be especially borne in mind that this is not a draft by Great Britain of British subjects and Canadians in the United States. These conventions merely provide that British citizens and Canadians in the United States shall become subject to military service and entitled to exemption and discharge therefrom under the laws of the United States, unless within the prescribed time they voluntarily enlist in the British forces or return to Great Britain or Canada for military service.

(Paragraph) The registration cards of all British subjects and Canadians, whether declarants or non declarants, and whether unclassified or classified, in Classes 1, 2, 3, 4 or 5, except those who have already been inducted into military service, and except those with respect of whom induction orders (Forms 1014 or 1028) have been issued, shall upon receipt hereof, be removed by Local Boards from the file of registration cards and shall be placed in a separate file. The registration

"shall remain in a separate file, where they may be available for inspection by properly accredited representatives of the British-Canadian Recruiting Mission. Until further notice, the induction of British subjects and Canadians, whether declarants or non-declarants, shall be suspended. Until further notice, the statement of a registrant on his registration card that he is a subject of Great Britain or Canada shall be sufficient evidence of his nationality, unless the Local Board is satisfied that such statement was not true.

(Paragraph) The following amendment to the Selective Service Regulations is hereby made, by the addition of the following:

(Paragraph) "On request of any registrant, or of a Recruiting officer of the British-Canadian Recruiting Mission, Local Boards shall furnish to any registrant who has stated on his registration card that he is a British subject, or a Canadian, a certificate in the following form, either in writing or by telegraph: 'It is hereby certified that _____, a registrant of this Local Board, stated on his registration card that he is a British subject, or a Canadian.' Thereafter, upon receipt by his Local Board of a notification by a commissioned officer of the British or Canadian Army, stating that he has been so enlisted, such notification shall be filed with his questionnaire and the registrant shall be placed in Class V and marked Division K."

2. There has been sent you by this office copies of the British and Canadian Conventions herein referred to, and additional copies of the same are being mailed to you today. The attention of all members of Local, Divisional and Legal Advisory Boards is invited to this subject.

The Local Board of Nome classified this registrant in Class III-1, on a certificate signed by Walter H. Johnson, the District Superintendent of Schools at St. Michael, claiming the registrant, Harry V. Johnson, school teacher at St. Michael, to be a necessary employee of the United States. On June 29, 1918, the Local Board, after having attention called to this case, notified Harry V. Johnson that unless he obtained a certificate from the United States Commissioner of Education, at Seattle, he would be re-classified. On July 10, 1918, the case of this registrant was appealed to the Divisional Exemption Board, at Nome, by the Appeals Agent. The Divisional Exemption Board met at Nome on July 26, 1918, and by a unanimous vote re-classified the registrant in Class I-a.

On taking this action, the Divisional Exemption Board, of News, gives the following information:

The registrant claimed deferred classification upon the ground that he was a Government teacher. Later the District Superintendent of Schools, Walter H. Johnson, filed a certificate claiming the registrant to be a necessary Government employee. This claim was made on the old form and was not verified nor accompanied by an affidavit. The registrant's appointment as a Government teacher terminated on June 30, 1918, and although he was recommended for continuation in that capacity, the recommendation has not been acted upon by Commissioner Lopp.

3. Upon the foregoing facts the Divisional Exemption Board made this re-classification, as stated, on July 26, 1918, and, although some four weeks elapsed between the time the case was reported and the time the decision was reached, the action appears to have been properly taken.

The manner in which Local Board No. 4, Ketchikan, Alaska, was handling the classification was far from right; that Board was assuming original jurisdiction and acting upon Industrial Claims for deferred classification, when the character of the claims was such that the registrant could not consistently be given such deferred classification; claims for deferred classification, based on industry and of such a character as to grade the registrant in either Class 2-C or 2-D, if granted, were referred to the Divisional Exemption Board, but not in accordance with the regulations, as the claims were allowed to accumulate until May 14th last before being sent to the Divisional Exemption Board. This resulted in holding in abeyance for a period of approximately two months the final classification of a considerable number of the registrants of that Board.

2. At my request, Mr. P. R. Bradley, a member of the Divisional Exemption Board, First Judicial Division, visited Ketchikan and investigated the conditions and the personnel of that Board, and in doing this incurred expenses aggregating \$37.80, as per attached voucher. This travel, although necessary in the execution of the Selective Service Law, was not authorized by resolution of the Divisional Exemption Board, and at the time I requested Mr. Bradley to visit Ketchikan for the purpose of investigating the conditions there, the matter of obtaining a travel order was overlooked.

3. I would therefore ask that you grant authority for the reimbursement of the traveling expenses incurred by Mr. Bradley, as set out in the attached voucher.

4. Mr. Bradley is a man who possesses great ability, is the General Manager and Consulting Engineer of the Treadwell and Alaska Juneau Mines, and also the Food Administrator of Alaska. He submitted a very complete report on the conditions at Ketchikan, and based on his report, the recommendation for Mr. Blue's removal was made, and Mr. M. S. Dobbs, the Collector of Customs at Ketchikan, was appointed to fill the vacancy.

5. I am pleased to state that since Mr. Bradley's visit to Ketchikan, and the change made, the service rendered by that Board in execution of the Selective Service Law has been thoroughly efficient.

Your attention is directed to the following instructions issued by the Provost Marshal General under date of June 7th, 1918:

"1. The attention of all Local Boards should be directed to Section 10, General Orders No. 28 of the United States Railroad Administration, effective June 10, 1918, which is quoted as follows:

'Passengers traveling in standard sleeping cars shall be required to pay an additional charge of sixteen and two-thirds (16-2/3) per cent of the normal one-way fare, and passengers traveling in tourist sleeping cars an additional passage charge of eight and one-third (8-1/3) percent of the normal one-way fare. The foregoing charges are in addition to those required for the occupancy of berths in sleeping cars.'

From this it will be noted that railroads will furnish three distinct classes of transportation for which there will be varying fares:

- (a) for transportation in day coaches;
- (b) for transportation in standard sleeping cars; these charges being exclusive of rates charged for berths in such equipment; and
- (c) for transportation in tourist sleeping cars; these charges being exclusive of rates charged for berths in such equipment.

2. The present form of request calls for transportation at 'lowest available rates.' These requests without alterations will be good for day coach travel only. When, under the instructions printed on the back of the transportation request, travelers are entitled to accommodations in tourist or standard sleeping cars for all or any part of the journey, the following procedure must be followed.

3. Where it is known that inducted men are to go from point of entrainment to destination in sleeping cars, the request for transportation may be altered by inserting the words 'with tourist increase' or 'with standard sleeping car increases', but not eliminating the words 'at lowest available rates', so that the request will then read 'Please furnish to John Doe and five other selected men at lowest available rates with tourist (or standard

sleeping car) increase transportation, etc.' This last procedure should only be followed when it is certain that the sleeping car accommodations will be available for the entire journey.

4. In all other cases issue one request without alteration good for coach travel for the entire trip; a second request on which the words 'at lowest available rates' should be eliminated and the words 'tourist increase' (where tourist cars are available) or 'standard sleeping car increase' should be interlined and showing the points between which the sleeping car accommodations are to be furnished; and a third request for the sleeping car accommodations themselves. This method makes it possible to insert the points between which sleeping car accommodations were actually furnished, or if not furnished, the request may be returned and cancelled and the railroads receive pay for only the coach service furnished.

5. For example, supposing a registrant or a party of men are traveling from New York to Jacksonville, Florida, via Washington, leaving New York in the morning -- one request would be made out without alterations for transportation from New York to Jacksonville, Florida. A second request would call for 'standard sleeping car increase' from Washington to Jacksonville, Florida, and a third request would call for sleeping car accommodations from Washington to Jacksonville, Florida.

6. Inasmuch as tourist sleepers must be used where available and these cars are obtainable only in certain sections, usually west and southwest of Chicago, and that standard sleeping cars may be used where tourist cars are not available, therefore, when going from standard car territory to tourist car territory different requests must be made. Example:- Supposing a registrant was being sent from Albany, New York, to American Lake, Washington, leaving Albany in the morning, one request would call for transportation at coach rates all the way through between the points named. A second request would call for 'standard sleeping car increase' from Buffalo to Chicago. A third request would call for 'tourist car increase' from Chicago to American Lake. A fourth request would call for 'standard Pullman accommodations' from Buffalo to Chicago, and a fifth request would call for 'tourist accommodations' from Chicago to American Lake.

7. Nothing in these instructions must be construed as authorizing classes of transportation other than that to which inducted men are entitled in accordance with the instructions now printed on the back of the transportation request. These instructions should be carefully studied.

8. These orders will largely increase the number of transportation requests to be issued. Additional supplies should be requisitioned for in ample time to care for this anticipated increase.

1. Walter Falk registered at Skagway, Alaska on arrival from the Yukon Territory October 30th, 1917. He was then 30½ years of age. He is a native of the State of Minnesota, unmarried, and was employed as a miner. After his arrival in Alaska, he resided in Juneau for a time, and was later employed at Gypsum, Alaska; the address which he gave at this time to the Local Board of Skagway was "Alaskan Hotel, Juneau". The Local Board of Skagway directed him to appear before the Local Board at Juneau for physical examination, and he was examined on May 2nd, 1918, and reported by the examining physician to be "physically qualified for general military service". The Local Board of Skagway wired him on May 9th, 1918 that he was called to the colors, but the message was reported back to the Local Board undelivered: "party said to have left Juneau". This message was sent by the Local Board of Skagway to Falk at the same time other messages were being sent by Local Boards of Alaska calling their registrants to the colors. The Local Board of Skagway thereafter received from him a letter dated May 9th, giving his address as Juneau. Immediately thereafter the Local Board of Skagway posted him as a delinquent, and on May 27th, this office mailed to Falk at Juneau, Alaska, delinquent order Form 1014, No. 320, directing him to report to this office for instructions not later than 10:00 o'clock on the morning of June 10th, 1918. The delinquent order mailed, as stated, to Falk at Juneau, was not returned from the post office undelivered. During the latter part of the day, the 11th of June, Falk came into this office. My Assistant immediately sent a cablegram to the Local Board at Skagway advising them that Falk was here and that we would arrange to send him to the mobilization camp. At this time Falk was instructed to report at this office on the morning of June 12th. He did not report as directed, and an inquiry was made to ascertain his whereabouts. When it was ascertained that he was employed on the vessel "King and Wings", on June 17th, a wire was sent to the Local Board for Division No. 6, Seattle, requesting them to have Falk go before that Board. (By this time we had received a letter from the Local Board of Skagway giving the information that they had been unable to reach him when he was called to the colors on May 9th.) We felt confident that the matter would be given the required attention by the Local Board for Division No. 6, Seattle. On the arrival of the "King and Wings"

at Ketchikan, July 5th, information was received that Falk had been detained at Seattle. Under date of July 28th, Local Board for Division No. 6, Seattle, wired that "investigating officer missed Falk - have never been able to locate him".

2. This office did not report this case to the Adjutant General of the Army on Form 1018 immediately after the expiration of the five days prescribed in Section 137 SBR, but we have since reported him.

3. Falk was reported "physically qualified for general military service" by the examining physician of the Local Board at Juneau, as above stated, and we are of the belief that since he was found qualified for military service, he has evaded the draft. A certified copy of Registration Card and a copy of the Report of Physical Examination of this registrant are attached for your information. In view of the instructions issued by the Provost Marshal General since Falk was examined "not to induct for general military service registrants having hernias of any kind or degree", he would now undoubtedly be disqualified.

4. This office was informed yesterday that Falk has at times stopped at the New Vendome Hotel (First Ave., Seattle, Wn.) and that he undoubtedly receives considerable mail. We have just inquired again at the Post Office, Juneau, to ascertain whether any forwarding address was left and we were informed that he left no forwarding instructions with them. The "King and Wings" is still in the North, but it is likely, in view of the fact that Falk has fraternized with the mariners in the employ of the National Independent Fisheries Company in the past, he may visit that vessel or other vessels operated by that company. We understand that these vessels dock at the Foot of Landers St., Seattle.

The only information which this office has received of the passage of an Act permitting the enlistment of the oppressed races of the Austro-Hungarian or German Empire is contained in Public-193-65th Congress. An extract from that Act is sent you herewith for your information.

"SLAVIC LEGION: That, under such regulations as the President may prescribe, a force of volunteer troops in such unit or units as he may direct may be raised to be composed of Jugo-Slavs, Czechs Slovaks, and Ruthenians (Ukrainians) belonging to the oppressed races of the Austro-Hungarian or German Empire resident in the United States but not citizens thereof nor subject to the draft. Such force shall be known as the Slavic Legion or by such other description as the President may prescribe. No man shall be enlisted in it until he has furnished satisfactory evidence that he will faithfully and loyally serve the cause of the United States and that he desires to fight the imperial governments of Germany and Austria-Hungary, and the allies thereof. The force so raised and duly sworn in to the service may be equipped, maintained, and trained with our own troops or separately as the President may direct and thereafter may be transported to such field of action as the President may direct to be used against the common enemy in connection with our own troops or with those of any nation associated with the United States in the present war; and the several items of expense involved in the equipment, maintenance, training, and transportation of such force may be paid from the respective appropriations herein made or from any subsequent appropriations for the same: PROVIDED, That American citizens of Austrian or German birth, or who were born in alien enemy territory, who have passed the necessary examination and whose loyalty is unquestioned, may, in the discretion of the Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy, be commissioned in the United States Army or Navy."

He will, therefore, not be discharged but retained for duty."

2. 1. Public No. 193, an Act making appropriations for the support of the Army for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1918, approved July 9th, 1918, contains the following:

"That the President may by proclamation set a day or days and place or places for the registration for military service of male aliens within designated ages residing within the United States who are citizens or subjects of a foreign country with whose Government the United States has concluded or hereafter concludes a convention or agreement in accordance with the terms of which its citizens or subjects within designated ages, residing within the United States, become under certain conditions liable to be drafted into the military service of the United States; that upon proclamation by the President stating the time and place of such registration it shall be the duty of any such alien, unless exempted from registration by the terms of the President's proclamation, to present himself for and submit to registration under the provisions of the Act approved May eighteenth, nineteen hundred and seventeen, entitled "An Act to authorize the President to increase temporarily the Military Establishment of the United States," and all amendments thereto, and he shall thereupon be registered in the same manner as those previously registered under the terms of said Act; and every such alien shall be deemed to have notice of the requirements of said Act and this joint resolution upon the publication by the President of any such proclamation, and any such alien who shall willfully fail or refuse to present himself for registration or to submit thereto shall be subject to all the provisions and liable to all the penalties provided in said Act or any amendment thereto.

"Sec. 2. That any such alien, when registered, shall be and remain liable to military service in the forces of the United States and subject to draft under the provisions of said convention or agreement and of said Act and all amendments thereto, and subject to such regulations as the President may have prescribed or may prescribe under the terms thereof, unless during the period specified in the convention or agreement concluded with the country whereof he is a citizen or subject and designated in the President's proclamation, he shall have enlisted or enrolled in the military forces of his own country or returned to his own country for the purpose of enlisting or enrolling in its military forces, or unless the country whereof he is a citizen or subject, through its diplomatic representatives, in accordance with the terms of the convention or agreement concluded between the United States and such foreign country, shall issue to such alien a certificate of exemption from military service.

"Sec. 3. That any such alien, after the expiration of the time fixed by the President's proclamation within which he may enlist or enroll in the military forces of his own country, return to his own country for the purpose of military service, or be exempted through the diplomatic representative of the country whereof he is a citizen or subject, shall be and remain subject in all respects to the terms, provisions, liabilities, and penalties of said Act and all amendments thereto, except as modified by the terms of the convention or agreement concluded between the United States and the country whereof such alien is a citizen or subject, and shall be subject to such regulations as the President may have prescribed or may prescribe under the terms of said Act.

"Sec. 4. That the second sentence of section two of the Act entitled 'An Act to authorize the President to increase temporarily the Military Establishment of the United States,' approved May eighteenth, nineteen hundred and seventeen, be and is hereby, amended to read as follows:

"That such draft as herein provided shall be based upon liability to military service of all male citizens or male persons not alien enemies who have declared their intention to become citizens between the ages of twenty-one and thirty years, both inclusive, and shall take place and be maintained under such regulations as the President may prescribe not inconsistent with the terms of this Act: PROVIDED, That a citizen or subject of a country neutral in the present war who has declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States shall be relieved from liability to military service upon his making a declaration, in accordance with such regulations as the President may prescribe, withdrawing his intention to become a citizen of the United States, which shall operate and be held to cancel his declaration of intention to become an American citizen and he shall forever be debarred from becoming a citizen of the United States."
